Horse Show Has Great Possibilities

Local citizens are proud of our Stouffville Horse Show and the job which the town Legion branch has done in promoting this fine attraction. The show has grown by leaps and bounds to be one of the most successful one-day horse shows conducted anywhere, and there is strong representation to have it enlarged to a two-day show and include driving horses. This year saw the largest entry of animals yet, nearly one hundred horses taking part. These horsemen and horsewomen like to come to the Stouffville show — they've told us so; they say they like the surroundings and are more than enthusiastic for the show to be enlarged into a two-day exhibition. The lower park grounds have made a wonderful site for holding these shows. The Legion boys did considerable work this year in cleaning up a still greater area of park ground and it would be possible to include a small track for the showing of hackney ponies and driving horses. Arrangements could be made, it is believed for the housing of horses and riders during a two-day show and possibly some day in the future, a building might be erected for this purpose. It is a fine thing for a town to have a horse show country fair once a year. It's a great rallying place for friends, it keeps alive the raising of high class horses and other livestock, and the publicity which the community receives from such a show is worth many dollars.

They Park Too Close

Stouffville side streets are narrow and it is an aggravating business trying to turn a car or truck out onto Main St. But the job is a hundred times worse because of vehicles parked close to and almost on the corners. Motorists should be obliged to keep back thirty feet from these corners in order to give a clear way of traffic to the motorist trying to enter the main artery. Some drivers have the gall, particularly on Saturday night, to park half way across the intersection and these promptly taken care of by the local O.P.P. if they are open on the scene. However they cannot force drivers to keep back any specified distance without bylaw provisions. A bylaw, passed by council, and approved by the Dept. of Highways, could keep vehicles clear of the corners and correct a dangerous practice which someday will result in serious collision since those approaching the side street cannot see oncoming traffic until they are practically out on the highway.

Two Separate Schools for Pickering Twp.

School is now well under construction and work will start on the Pickering School soon. The cost of the Pickering school will be \$35,000. Father Rev. W.A. McGivney of St. Francis de Sales Parish told the press this week that there are new pupils coming in to enroll every day and the enrollment of the two schools may well exceed the approximate 80 pupils each by the time school opens.

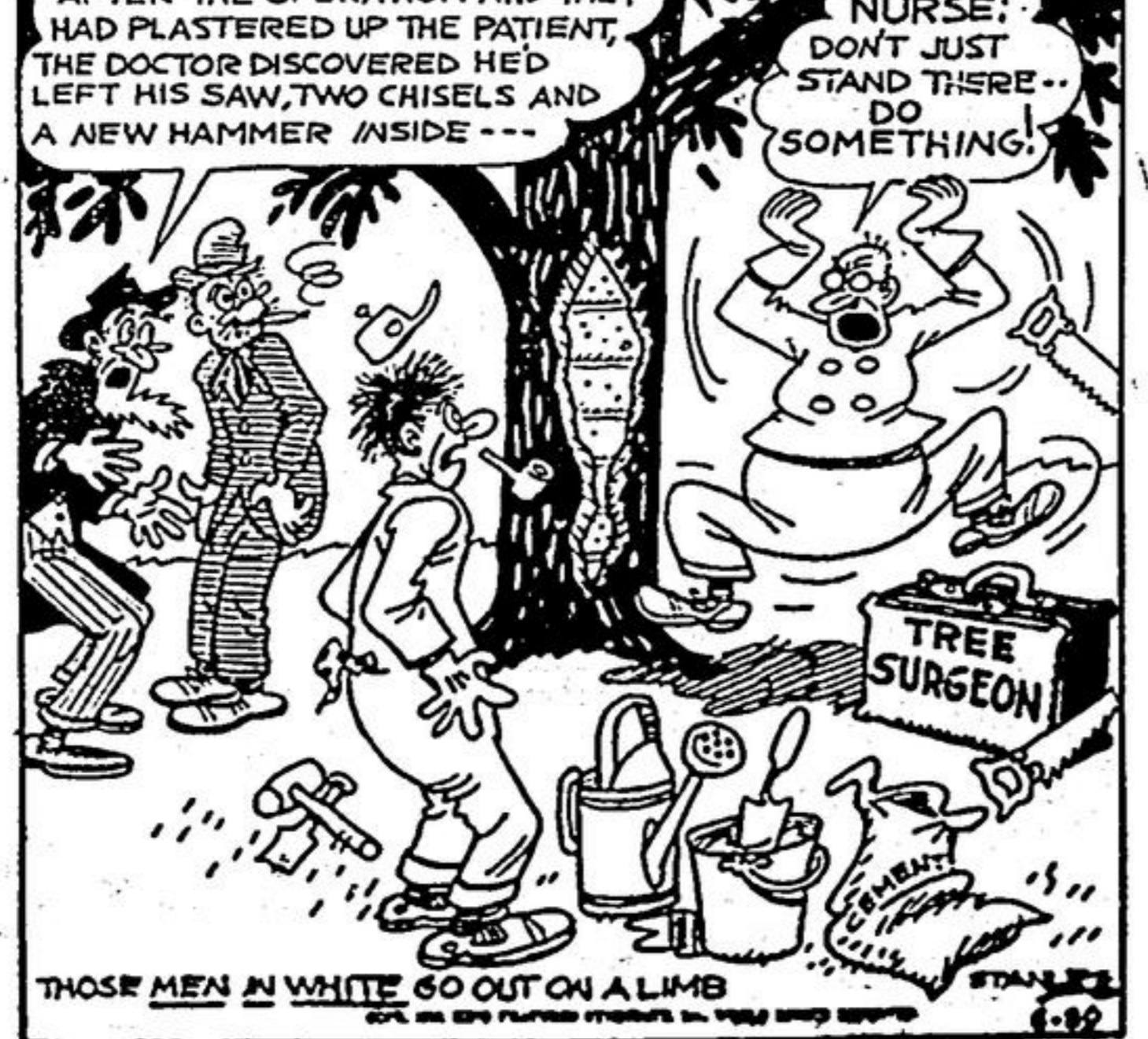
MONDAY NOW FAVORITE DAY FOR ELECTIONS

Monday has come up as the favorite day of those who pick general election dates. Choice of Aug 10 for the election put Monday into the lead among days chosen for balloting since Confederation. The selection makes it seven Monday elections and six on Tuesday since 1874, the first year in which elections were held on a single day. Five have been called on Thursdays and two on Wednesdays. There have been none on Friday, Saturday or Sunday since the one-day procedure began. Of the six elections beginning in 1930 and including the present one, five have been on Mondays. The sixth—in 1940—was on a Tuesday. Before 1874, elections took weeks to complete. The first in 1867 ran from Aug. 7 to Sept. 20. The 1872 voting lasted three months. Stirling, Sept. 15-16

From the Files of the Tribune 28 Years Ago For some weeks past extensive improvements have been going on at the town park, and any of our citizens who have not visited the public grounds this summer should take time to do so. The grandstand has been painted and although the color will always be popular with the losing team on the diamond, it looks much better than before the paint was applied. The small round band stand has also been touched up with blue paint while over on the new grounds, south-west of the bowling green, substantial swings have been erected for the kiddies. Nearby a rustic bridge crosses a restful nook of willows where picnic tables are to be found in a most delightful setting. To the south of the bowling green is a motor camp equipped with a splendid kitchen and water from the town reservoir on tap. Electric lights have been installed as well. A sign will be placed on the Main St. directing motorists to the free camping site. Mr. J.S. Bell of the Markham High School staff is presiding at the examinations in the local school over the third form. The appropriation of \$20,000 for a new post office building in Stouffville has been granted. Over 400 members of the Raymer clan gathered together by Parliament. Mr. D.M. Raymer of Markham was elected president and Mr. George Hoover of Markham as secretary-treasurer. The retiring president, Mr. O.L. Raymer was tendered a vote of thanks for his tenure of office. Farmers in the vicinity of Stouffville began cutting their alfalfa hay last week but they were more or less delayed by frequent showers. Fall wheat is all headed out and spring grains are making good growth. Many of the citizens have removed the weeds from the front of their premises but still there are neglected boulevards along the Main Street which should not be allowed.
