**Scott Tp. Withdraws Assessment Appeal**  
Scott Township has withdrawn its appeal against the equalized assessment of Ontario County. Following the June Session of the Ontario County Council, at which the equalized rate assessment of the county was struck, Scott Twp. announced its intention to appeal the equalized assessment on the ground that Scott's assessment was too high. This matter would have come before His Honour Judge F.J. McRae had the appeal not been withdrawn by Scott. Notice that the appeal was being withdrawn came last week. Now it is too late for any further appeals, hence the equalized assessment adopted by the County Council last month will stand.  
Scott Township's equalized assessment in 1952 was \$1,924,662. On returns filed at the end of the year, the assessment dropped by \$6185 but the County Assessment Committee saw fit to raise the assessment by \$50,000 rather than allow a decrease. This brought Scott's 1953 equalized assessment to \$1,968,477.

**Rowdies at Lake Arrested and Fined \$350**  
Provincial police warn that road-blocks will be set up to prevent any influx of teen-aged Toronto gangs that started with a wave of rowdiness at Musselman's Lake last weekend.  
Two gangs of Toronto youths from the Cabbagetown and Parkdale districts moved into the area Saturday, armed with home-made blackjacks and carrying liquor.  
Police promptly arrested 13 of them when a fracas started and prevented what promised to be a full-scale riot. Twelve went to the Don Jail charged with creating a disturbance. The other faced a drunk-driving charge.  
In police court on Monday, the group was fined a total of \$350 by Magistrate Hollinrake and warned that authorities would not take a lenient view of their nonsense.
