## Pickering Twp. Adopts Wage Agreement with PD

Pickering Twp. Council has adopted a salary schedule for its police force. The schedule adopted by the council was one recommended by the Pickering Twp. Police Commission, made up of Judge F.J. MacRae, Magistrate F.S. Ebbs and Reeve George Todd.

The schedule of wages as recommended by the Commission and adopted later by the council is as follows: 1st class constable, \$3,000; 2nd class constable, \$2,900; 3rd class constable, \$2,800; probationer, \$2,600. The probationary period was recommended to be for three months only, then move to third class constable. After one year and one day, the officer moves to second class constable and at the end of one year and one day becomes a first class constable. The council adopted the recommended schedule, on motion of Councillor Newman and Deputy Reeve Balsdon, providing arbitration procedure be discontinued.

Upon a recommendation of the Pickering - Whitby Townships Joint Planning Board, the Pickering Council has decided to re-open the granting of subdivisions providing certain regulations are observed. The recommendation of the Planning Board was that the township re-open the granting of subdivisions providing: that all dwellings within such subdivisions have a floor area of at least 960 square ft. for one-storey - 750 square feet for one-and-one-half storey - and 650 square feet for two-storey houses; that inside plumbing complete with three piece bath be required for all new dwellings in the proposed subdivisions; that all proposed subdivisions south of a line midway between concessions 2 and 3 be required to install municipal water without cost to the municipality. On motion of Councillors Newman and Michell council approved the recommendation.

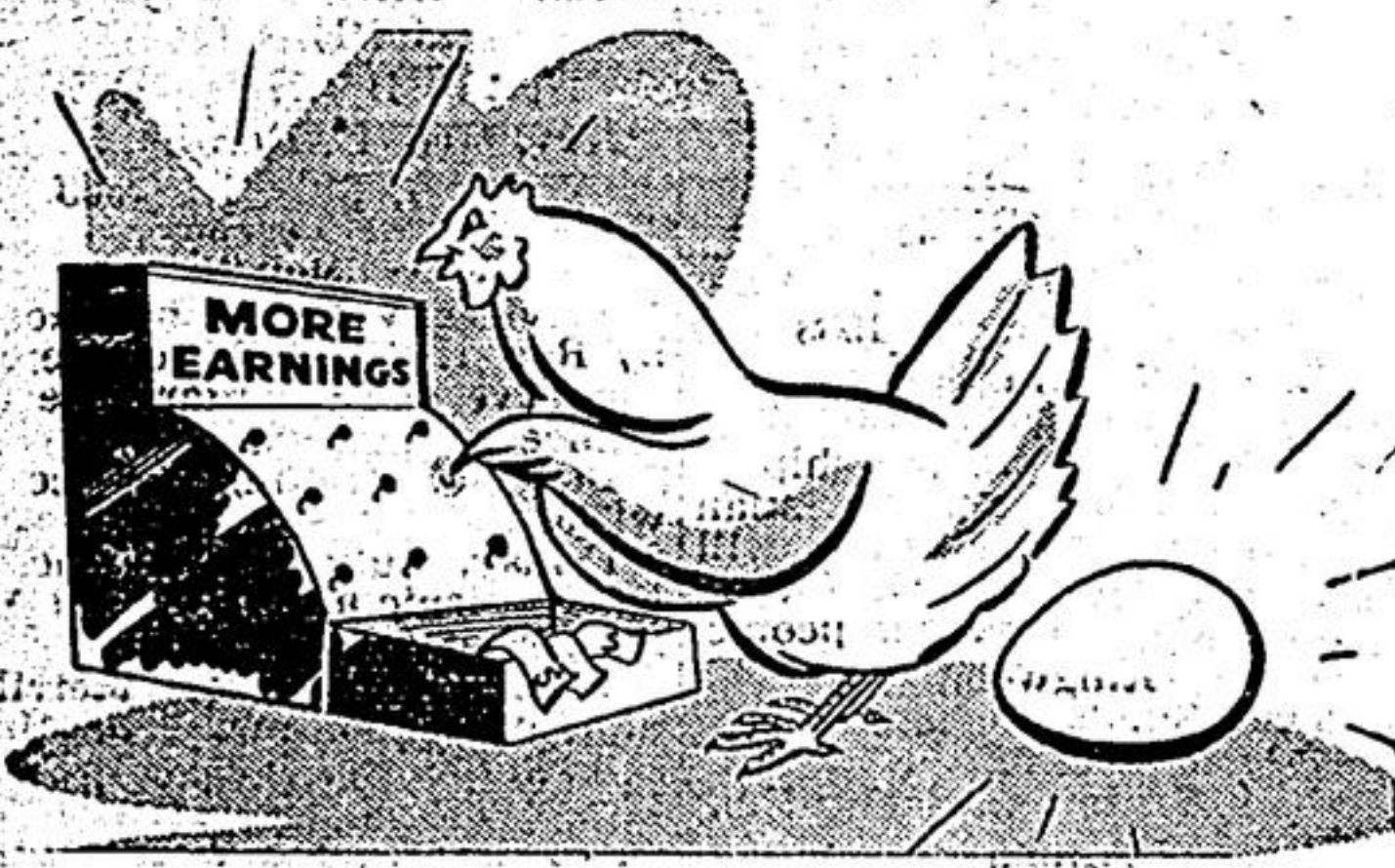
