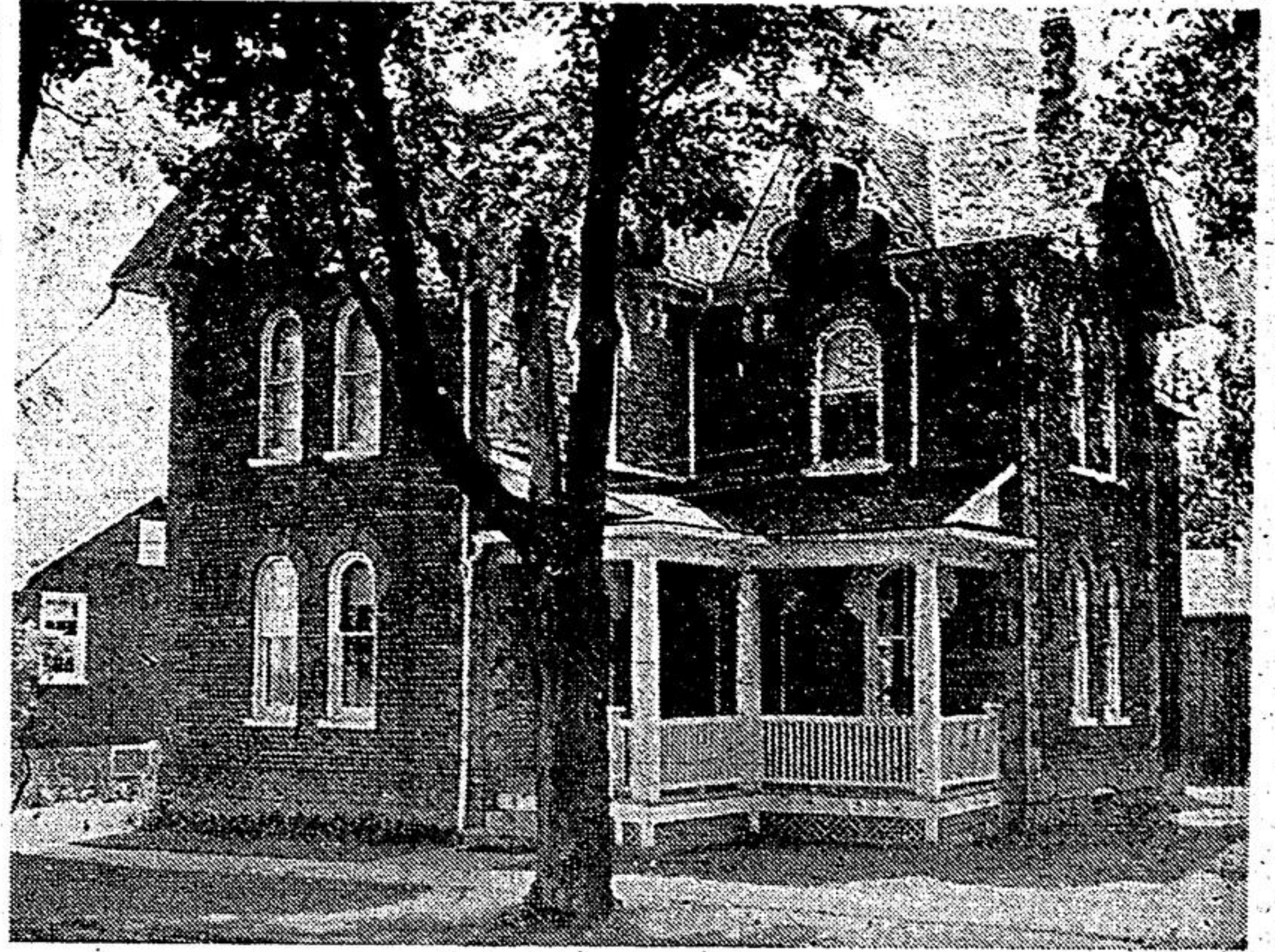


Our Local and Personal Happenings

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FUMIGATE OR SPRAY ALL GRANARIES BEFORE HARVEST

If granary is empty, spray all walls, floor, boards and bags with 5% DDT oil spray.

All old grain being carried over should be fumigated. Do not apply DDT to grain.

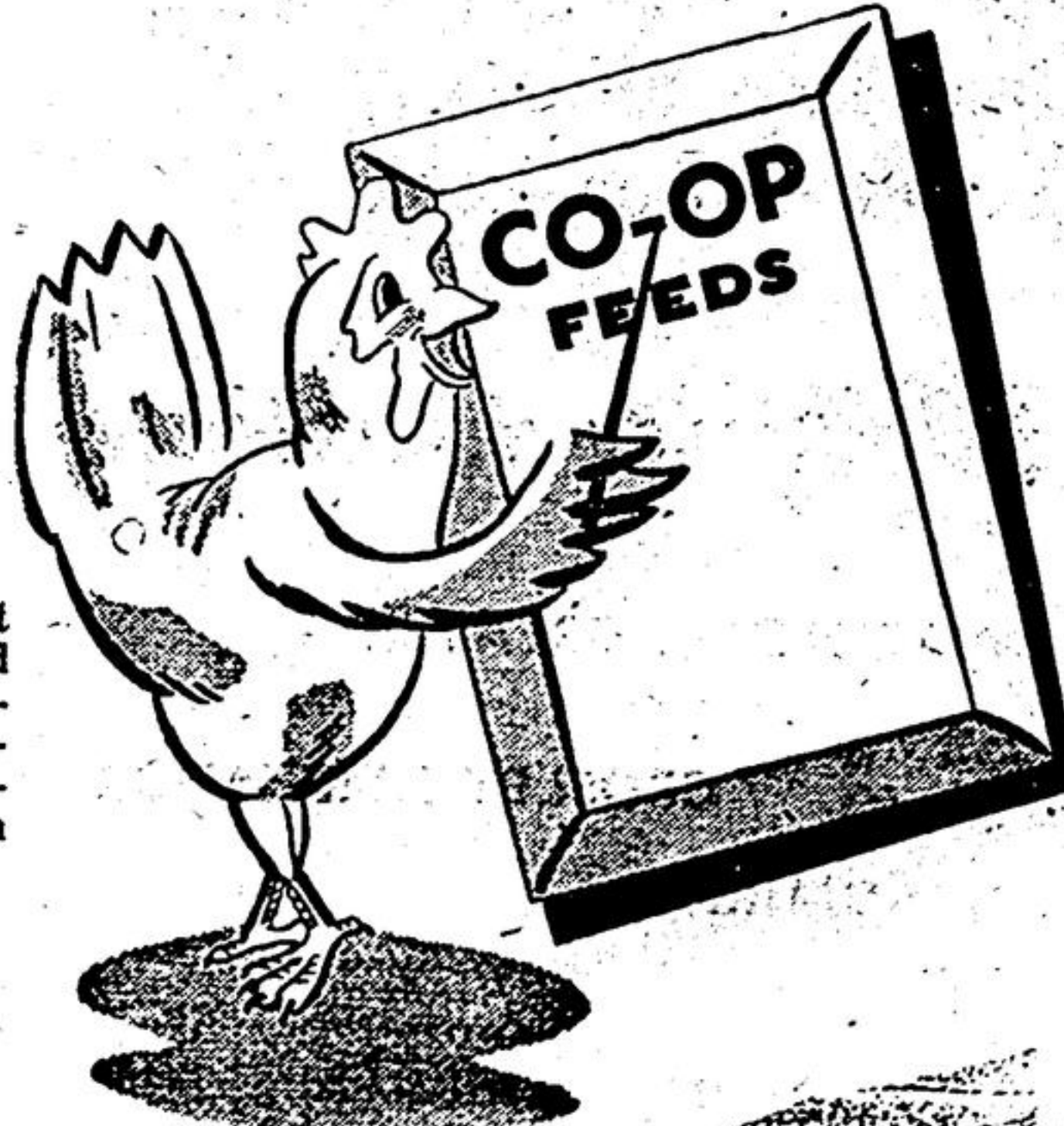
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
