### 70 Candidates For 21 Seats

Seventy candidates officially entered the Aug. 10 federal election fight Monday, filing papers and paying \$200 deposits in 21 of the country's 263 constituencies.

The general nomination day is July 27, two weeks in advance of the vote. Monday's nominations were in large scattered constituencies.

Liberal govt. candidates are contesting all 21. Progressive Conservatives entered the fight in 15, CCF in 13, Social Credit in nine and Labor Progressives in eight. There were three independent entries, two of them in the new constituency of Mackenzie River which takes in Mackenzie district in the Northwest Territories.

There were no surprises. Trade Minister Howe moved into an anticipated four-way fight in Port Arthur where he is seeking his fifth term. He is opposed by Progressive Conservative, CCF and Labor-Progressive candidates.

J.W. Pickersgill, new secretary of state, has a Progressive Conservative opponent in Bonavist-Twillingate, the Newfoundland seat held by his predecessor in the cabinet, F. Gordon Bradley.
