Whitby Provincial Police recovered a stolen car on the 9th concession of Pickering, east of Claremont near the Cedar Creek school on Friday night following a report from a Brooklin resident that his auto had been stolen in Whitby. The vehicle was discovered lying on its side and it was necessary to cut through the wire fence in order to free the car. The driver apparently lost control of the car on loose gravel, hit a culvert and rolled over. The car stopped only a few feet from a considerable drop into a nearby creek. The vehicle was badly damaged. There was no sign of the thief near the accident scene. Ken Ward, local Claremont garage operator was summoned by police to tow the car off the roadside. The owner vacated his auto in Whitby for a few minutes leaving the keys in the ignition. When he returned the car was gone.

Directed that "No Parking" signs be erected at the end of Pickering Beach Road and Shoal Point Road.

Agreed that 30 miles an hour speed limit zone be declared at Rouge West.

Agreed that the treasurer of Pickering Village be paid \$1,000 on account of division of Assets according to Agreement when village was incorporated recently.

Defeated motion whereby if 90% of the township employees sign for Hospital Co-Operative Plan, council will pay 50% of the premiums.

Bylaw passed to close a portion of the Brock Rd. may be straightened.

Passed bylaw prohibiting the erection of a building or structures on land unsuitable for such purpose.

The police department was instructed - to prosecute the Ashworth Wrecking Yard and warn the owner about further wrecking.

Received report concerning the cost of possible park land as follows: 100 acres of the Cook farm near Green River would be \$30,000 and twenty acres from the Buckles farm would be \$8,000 to \$10,000.

Two Stand Trial For Entering Garage And Audley School

Two men are in custody in the Ontario County Jail pending completion of hearings in Magistrate's Court into two alleged break-ins, one at Audley School and the other at the A. W. Mitchell Coal Yard, Pickering. Edward Preswick and Rowell Hall McClary were brought before Magistrate F.S. Ebbs in the Whitby Police Court this week jointly charged with both offences. Hall, a private in the Canadian Army, pleaded guilty to both counts. Preswick pleaded guilty only to the charge of entering the Audley School. Some evidence was taken and at the request of the Crown Attorney, Alex. Hall, QC, the case was set over for one more week.

Brian Disney, a Pickering Township resident, told the Court that on the early morning of June 22nd he had been proceeding along the Station Road when he noticed a car parked in the vicinity of the Mitchell Coal Yard. Thinking this peculiar, he stopped his own vehicle and hearing noises from the direction of the garages, called out. He received no reply, he said, and then blew his car horn. Then, he continued, he saw two men run away from the garages. He reported the car which was parked there and called police.

Thomas Watson, taxi operator, told the Court that about 6 a.m. he had received a call for a taxi and had picked up Preswick about one and one-quarter miles from the Mitchell yard. He recounted the driving he had done for him before letting him out. He noted that Preswick at that time wore no shoes.

Constable Freeman, of the Pickering Police Dept., testified that he had searched the abandoned car and had found therein a radio and an alarm clock which were introduced. These articles, he said, had been identified as coming from the Audley School. He also produced padlocks which he had found in the vicinity of the garages, which appeared to have been broken or sprung.

Miss Spratt, teacher at Audley School, told the Court that her school had been entered and the clock and radio had been removed.

At the suggestion of Crown Attorney Hall, the case was adjourned for one week pending the arrival of records from the RCMP at Ottawa.
