

NEW ARENA FOR WHITBY

The Community Arena Board last week awarded a contract to the T. A. Wilson Lumber Co., Ltd., of Cannington for the construction of a new arena. This action by the Board taken at a meeting held at the home of Judge MacRae is virtual assurance that Whitby will have a new arena by December, 1953.

Included in the contract was an agreement with the John Inglis Co. Ltd., for the purchase of an artificial ice plant. The inclusion of artificial ice for the coming season's operation will be dependent on the further support of the project by local and district citizens.

The Wilson Co. has purchased the present Kinsmen Arena from the Board and will commence demolition by the latter

part of July. Mr. Wilson is building several other arenas this summer and

the quick action was required by the Board in order to ensure completion of the rink for the coming winter. It is expected that it will be possible to open the arena for skating by December 15.


