**NEW ARENA FOR WHITBY**  
The Community Arena Board last week awarded a contract to the T. A. Wilson Lumber Co., Ltd., of Cannington for the construction of a new arena. This action by the Board taken at a meeting held at the home of Judge MacRae is virtual assurance that Whitby will have a new arena by December, 1953.

Included in the contract was an agreement with the John Inglis Co. Ltd., for the purchase of an artificial ice plant. The inclusion of artificial ice for the coming season's operation will be dependent on the further support of the project by local and district citizens.

The Wilson Co. has purchased the present Kinsmen Arena from the Board and will commence demolition by the latter part of July.

Mr. Wilson is building several other arenas this summer and the quick action was required by the Board in order to ensure completion of the rink for the coming winter. It is expected that it will be possible to open the arena for skating by December 15.

**JACK COTE TO PLAY IN O. R. F. U.**  
Jack Cote, 200-pound O. V. C. grad has signed a contract with the Kitchener-Waterloo Hurricanes, newly organized entry in the Ontario Rugby Football Union. During his stay in town, Jack lined up with the local Red Sox as an outfielder and also played one season with the Peaches A. C. hockey team. While attending the Ontario Veterinary College at Guelph he played football with the "Aggies" College team along with another well known local resident, Duncan Smith.

**ERNE DICKENS TO COACH MOTOR CITY SQUAD**  
Manager Wren Blair of the Smith Truckmen's Sr. B hockey club has announced some interesting changes for the coming season. Stouffville Red Sox to date have yet to suffer a loss in their current Tri-County League schedule. Stouffville had to call on the reserves to field a team for the contest. Lou Raxlin took over the third base position and Hassard moved to short to replace Les Clarke who was unable to attend. Graham Frisby, a regular with the hustling Juvenile squad, was brought up for the game. Lorne Schell and Hal Gibson formed the battery for the Red Sox opposed by Geo. Holborne and Keith Dunn for Sutton.

The Red Sox counted a single run in the second as outfielder Ted Cadieux rifled a single through the infield to score Hal Gibson who received a base on balls. Stouffville added another in the top half of the sixth with the same combination. Hal Gibson and Ted Cadieux once again uncorking hits off hurler Holborne. The locals led 2-0 at the end of 5 1/2 innings.

Sutton came through with a last ditch rally in their half of the sixth inning. Two errors allowed Rowe and Holborne a life and Pollock came through with the payoff hit to deadlock the count. Holborne credited himself with ten strike outs while Schell whiffed four batters. Schell gave up but three hits in the entire eight innings while Holborne was clipped six times.

Hal Gibson, Stouffville's long ball hitter, injured his hand in the fifth inning and was replaced back of the plate by Coach Hassard. Gibson took over the shortstop duties vacated by the Red Sox manager.

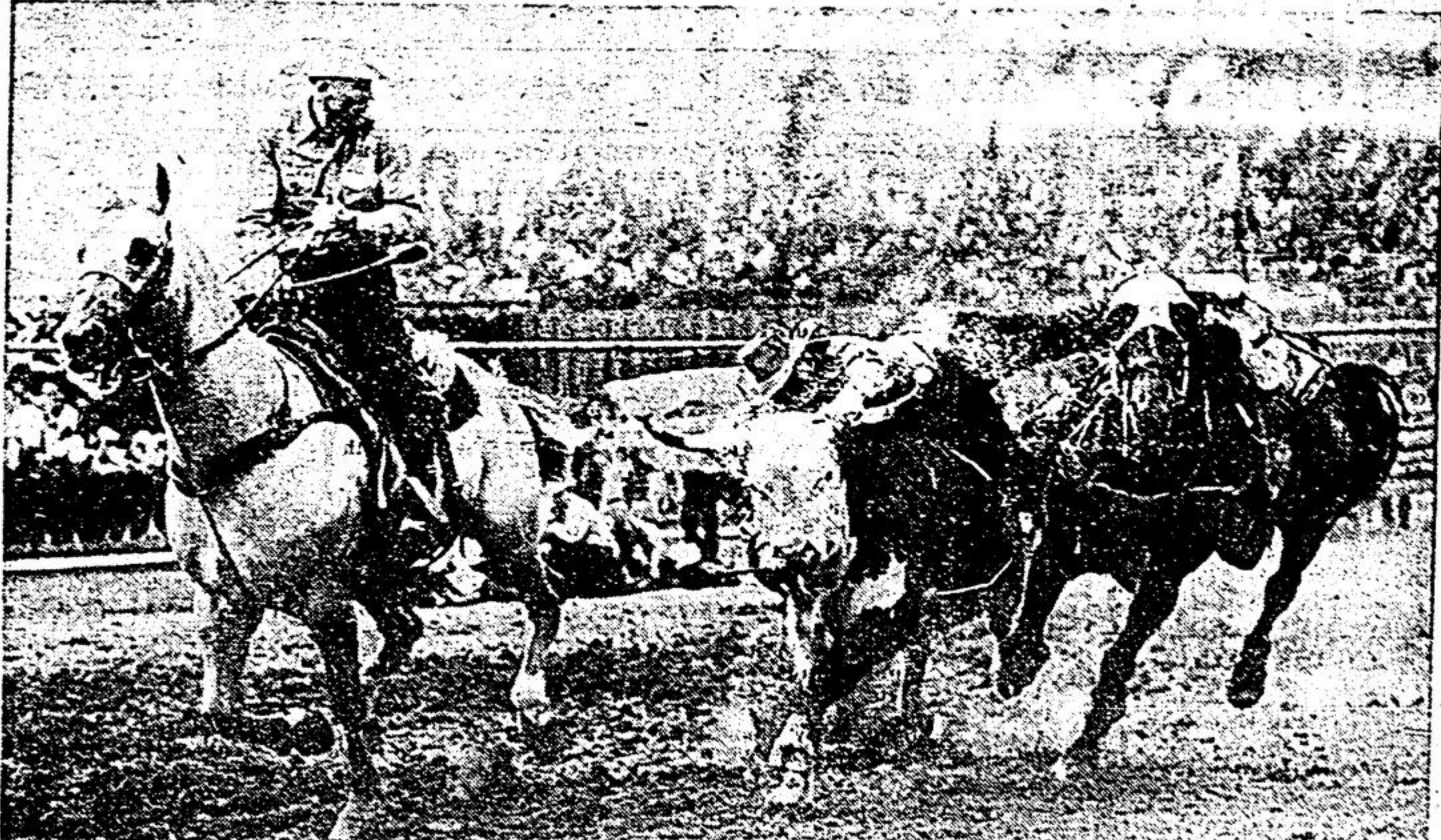
### Juveniles Sweep Home And Home Series With Aurora

Stouffville's Juveniles came through last week to sweep a two game home and home encounter with Aurora by scores of 4-3 and 3-3. Right-hander Murray Stewart fired a four hitter on Wednesday evening while southpaw Dave Hammersley limited the Yonge Street squad to five hits here on Friday.

In the first contest, Stouffville collected four hits and four walks in the third inning to score four runs, enough to win the game. They counted one in the second to tie the score after Aurora jumped into the lead in the first. The Yonge Street crew rallied with two runs in the sixth but the fire was put out when Cook fled out to Wagg in centre field and Hodgkinson and McFarlane went down on strikes. The local batsmen were kept in check fairly well throughout the game with the exception of the one bad inning when the team momentarily fell apart. Ross Madill, Murray Stewart and Cliff Morris shared in the three hits dished out by the Aurora hurler.

Here at home on Friday, Stouffville was forced to come from behind in the sixth inning to score a 4-3 victory over the visitors. Don Haynes and Morris crossed the plate with the winning runs in the club's final turn at bat. Morris put Stouffville in the lead in the bottom half of the third when he singled on an error. Frisby pounded out a safety. Forfar singled and Wagg tapped out a base hit scoring one run. Three runners were left stranded when Hollingsworth went down swinging. Dave Hammersley brought Haynes in with Stouffville's second run in the fourth and the same batters came through again in the final inning. Southpaw Hammersley held the visitors off the score sheet until the fourth when a hit and an error allowed two runs to score. Waite and Knowles put Aurora back in the game. Knowles added the other run in the sixth and although McFarlane, representing the tying run was parked on third with two out, Keroff grounded out Morris to Hodgson to end the game. To date, Stouffville has lost but one game, that to Bolton early in the schedule.
