Markham Tp. School Rep. Stands Alone For Vocation School

(W. Dean gave this report on preparations for a new High School at Thornhill.)

Markham Twp. Council:

As requested by you, and as your representative on the Richmond Hill District High School Board, I am making the following report concerning the proposed erection by the Board of a new high school to serve the Thornhill area.

In this report I shall attempt to logically develop the past and present thinking associated with the planning for this school.

I feel no one can honestly disagree with the premise that additional accommodation is required. A quick glance at the attendance figures, both present and anticipated, for the high school in Richmond Hill will confirm the fact that added classroom space is of prime importance. The Board must prepare this coming fall term to accommodate an additional 200 pupils, plus any additional immigration in the area, in the present high school and in order to do so has requested the Principal to introduce a staggered system of classes requiring an additional 5 teachers. The Board does not feel that it is over-estimating to say that it will be called upon within five years to accommodate from 800 to 1,000 more pupils, bearing in mind the fact that the figures issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics show that for the short period alone from June to December 1952, 194,000 persons immigrated to Canada.

The Board discussed the use of portables and possible additions to the present building, but both of these alternatives proved unsatisfactory because of their limited capacity.

Regarding the site for the proposed school. Since early last year the Property Committee has been considering various properties throughout the southern part of the school district as possible sites for the school. In February the Board decided on a suitable site for the erection of a 2nd high school. The site consists of a rectangular shaped parcel containing approximately 13 1/2 acres, being parts of lots east of the boundary of the Village of Thornhill. The Department has recommended that the school site should contain at least 10 acres. The Board has secured Departmental approval of this site, and we have taken the necessary legal steps through the solicitor to guarantee that the property will still be available for purchase once the debentures are issued.

Now, Gentlemen, as to the type of school. The Department has stated that the Board can build two different types of schools, both of which would be eligible for grant purposes. By a majority decision, I cast the only dissenting vote, the Board approved the erection of an Academic school, with 27 classrooms, (24 classrooms and 3 labs) and a double gym to accommodate 810 pupils at an estimated cost of \$720,000.00.

Of this total figure, the sum

of \$540,000.00 will be eligible for grant purposes. The Department will not pay subsidy on the \$180,000.00 double gym. The alternative to this type of school, and that which I have advocated, would be an Academic school with practical options, the same type as we have at Richmond Hill. Such a type of school as this would contain facilities for Home Economics, Sewing, Library, Art, Music, Commercial, two Shops and a Cafeteria, plus the same number of Labs and double gym. This Academic school, with practical options, would cost an estimated \$1,020,000.00, of which sum \$480,000.00 would be eligible for grant.

Naturally this second type of school is going to cost somewhat extra, but let us bear in mind that in any case we are going to spend at least \$720,000.00. With the extra expenditure we will be in a position to meet the students requests for Vocational training.

One needs only to check the available statistics to realize the great number of children throughout the province who prefer a vocational type of education. It is estimated that slightly less than one child in ten, after receiving a purely Academic education, proceeds into University. In many cases after completion of an academic course, added expense is incurred when the parents have to turn around and send the child to Business College. When the present High School District was set up, as an Area Board, the municipalities of Richmond Hill and Woodbridge, the Townships of Markham and Vaughan, by prior agreement, decided to send the children residing in the westerly part of Vaughan Twp. to Weston High who desired, a vocational education. At least the children of the Thornhill area should have the same opportunity of attending a high school of equal classification to the one in Richmond Hill, and the new schools that are being built at Markham, Stouffville, and Aurora.

However, regardless of my own personal feelings on the subject, I think the Ratepayers who are to be served by any new high school should be allowed to express a preference. Some effort should be made to secure an expression of opinion from the Ratepayers in the southern area, as to the type of school they prefer for their children.

Ernest representations have been made to me not only by numerous individuals but also by several Ratepayer and Home and School groups who are very anxious to know what type of school the Board intends to erect. Unfortunately the Board has reached its decision and the Department given its final approval for the erection of an Academic school without bothering to consult the Ratepayers. In true democratic fashion I certainly feel the Board should have held a Public Meeting at which the Ratepayer's concerned would have been given the opportunity to express their wishes, and to have had their questions answered.
