Half Mile of Paved Road For Claremont

A half mile north from Claremont is to be paved this year by Ontario County according to a 25-mile hard-topping program which was sanctioned by the county last week.

At a special meeting of the County Council last week in Whitby, members learned that the Ontario Municipal Board granted its approval to spending \$100,000 on paving and also were told that the Department of Highways would pay a 50 per cent subsidy on mulca paving, generally considered maintenance but this time considered construction.

The application to the two provincial bodies was made at the June session of the County Council. At that time, a proposed road budget of \$405,000 was cut to \$345,000 by the Ontario Department of Highways. Then, council members asked permission to carry out a paving program this year costing \$100,000 to be paid by debenture. There was some speculation at that time that the department would not pay a subsidy for mulch paving, but it was learned this week that this subsidy would be paid.

A total of 25 miles will be paved this year since there was enough funds in the \$315,000 budget to pave 5.2 miles. R.E. Sims, County engineer reported that it would only take \$68,300 to complete the paving job already planned this year when the budget had been struck. He explained that the original estimates for paving had included the prime seal but this had been applied out of this year's funds without dipping into the \$100,000. He also pointed out that 3.2 miles had been paved this year out of the budget and an additional two miles was about to be paved. He therefore drew up plans for spending the remaining \$31,700, work which was not included in this year's plans.

He submitted a report showing where the 25 miles would be laid this year. Included in the report is the 5.2 miles already arranged for plus the 19.8 miles to be paid by debenture.

Fire and chemical explosions early Sunday destroyed the \$200,000 Beaverlamb and Shearling Co. Ltd., fur firm in Uxbridge.

Fire of unknown origin broke out in the old three-story brick building at 4 a.m. setting off several explosions that levelled the premises.

Company officials said the building was valued at \$100,000 and that a similar amount of machinery, chemicals, furs and sheep hides were a complete loss.

Members of the Uxbridge Volunteer Fire Brigade, assisted by a crew from Port Perry were unable to control the blaze.
