ONE OF CHURCH STREET'S ORIGINAL HOMES



This is the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Pipher, and one of the earliest homes on Church Street. The place was originally occupied by Samuel Burkholder, grandfather of Frank Burkholder of Markham, and well-known undertaker of that day. Mr.

Burkholder later relinquished his residence there and erected the present Smith apartment house further up the street. The house was sold to Dr. Rowan who spent some years there and disposed of to another in the profes-

sion. Dr. F. Dales who remodelled the house considerably. The Dr. Dales family was followed by Mr. and Mrs. Pipher who came there to live from their farm home, now the Win Timbers place on the townline west.

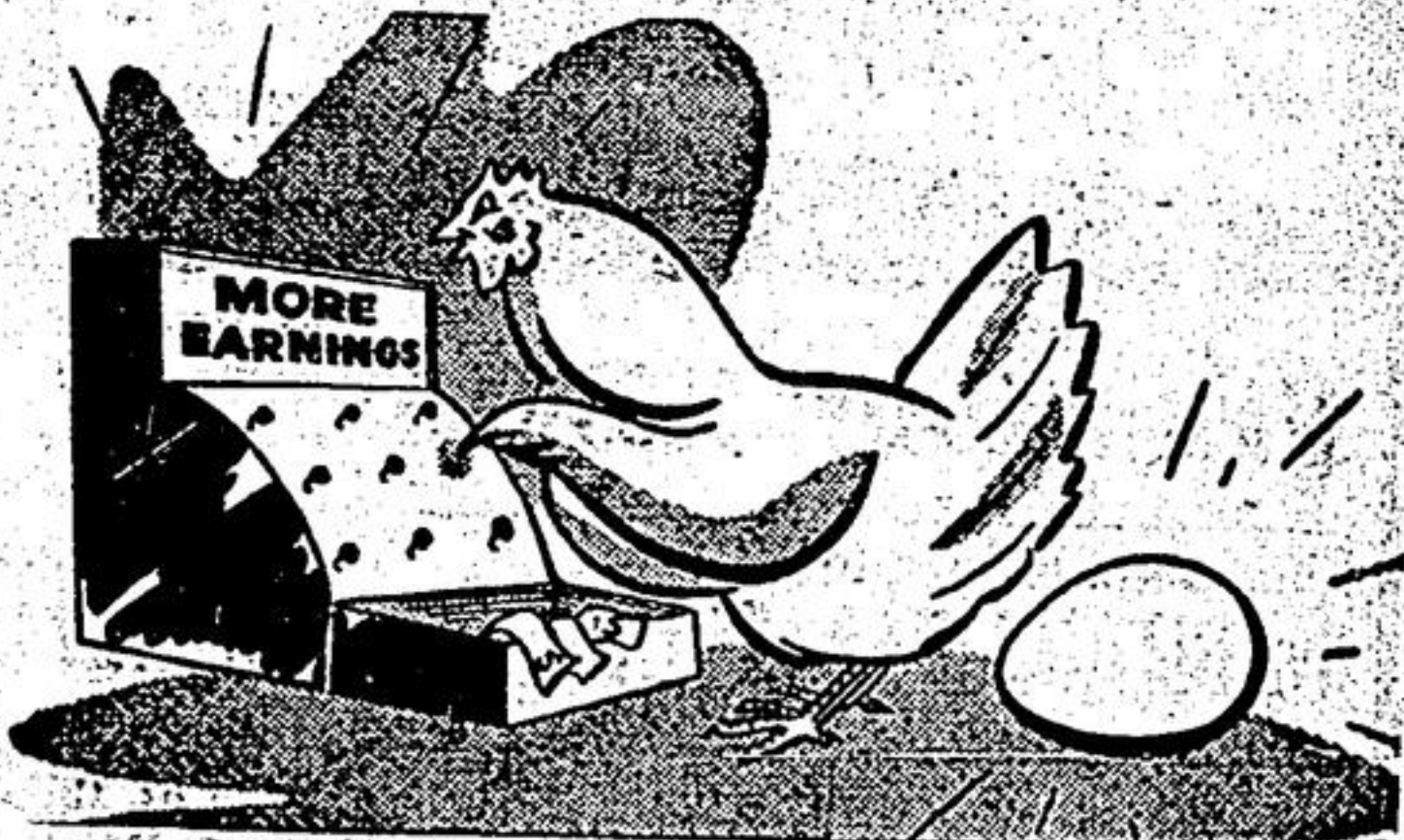
