Building Bylaw Misinterpreted?

Whether or not a building, originally a taxi stand on Highland Park sub-division, and originally only 8'x10', is beyond the jurisdiction of building permits, is to be settled for Markham Township by the Building Inspector Ross Norton and township solicitor J. D. Lucas.

Some time ago, following a request from the ratepayers of the sub-division, council passed a resolution requesting the building inspector to remove the building. However, on questioning Monday evening, council was informed by the inspector that a building only 8'x10' did not require a permit and did not therefore come within the scope of the bylaw. Mr. Norton went on to state that only recently siding had been added which brought the outside dimensions to beyond the above stated measurement and he believed that he could now ask for a permit.

Deputy - Reeve LeMasurier attempted to show that there was a clause in the bylaw which prohibited the building and on that point no agreement was reached and the matter was to be left to the Inspector and solicitor to determine correctly.

Councillor Lennie maintained that the inspector should have produced written reason why the building was not removed following council's resolution. Mr. Norton stated that written reason could have been given had it been asked for.

A report from the T.T.C. revealed that the Yonge St. bus service made a profit in the month of June of approximately \$1,000 as compared with a loss of \$2,000 for the same period last year.
