

Thirty-Two Thousand On Voters' List Once Were 70,000

Held by the Liberals since 1935, York North riding has been trimmed down in the creation of the new ridings of York Centre and York Scarborough. Formerly the southern boundary of York North touched the city limits. The new boundary is along No. 7 Highway. York Centre acquired the southwest portion of York North and the village of Woodbridge. York Scarborough took Markham Twp. below No. 7 Highway. Once there were more than 70,000 voters in York North. Now there are 32,000. There will be 147 polling stations established throughout the riding on election day. Candidates include a newspaper publisher seeking his third consecutive term as the sitting member, a gentleman farmer and a hospital employee. JACK SMITH, federal member for North York since 1945, is again carrying the Liberal standard in the riding. For 27 years, Mr. Smith has been edi-

tor and publisher of The Liberal in Richmond Hill, one of York County's oldest weekly newspapers. Past president of the Richmond Hill Lions Club and director of the Richmond Hill Agricultural Society, Mr. Smith was born on a Victoria County farm in 1901. A graduate of Lindsay High School, Mr. Smith has been associated with the newspaper business throughout his life. Active in community affairs, he is a past president of the Richmond Hill Lacrosse Club when the Young Canadians won high honors in provincial competition. He enjoys curling, bowling and fishing. Married, the candidate has three daughters, Mary Elizabeth, Ruth Alverna, who is associate editor of The Liberal, and Eleanor who graduates this year from Richmond Hill High School. C.A. "TINY" CATHERS, Progressive Conservative candidate, has lived in the Newmarket district for 16 years. Father of four children, Mr. Cathers was born and raised on a farm and has pledged himself to better the income of the Eastern Canada farmer. ONTARIO SEED GROWERS HONOURED AT WESTERN CONVENTION

Three Ontario seed growers were signally honored by the Canadian Seed Growers' Association at their recent convention at Clear Lake, Manitoba, when they were numbered among some thirteen growers elected as Robertson Associates. The Ontario men were Frank Weaver, Turnerville, W.A. Vail, Denfield, and Frank Marritt, Keswick. The class of seed grower known as Robertson Associate was created in honour of the late Dr. J.W. Robertson, co-founder of the Canadian Seed Growers' Association and has been in operation since 1930. Robertson Associate is recognized as the highest honour in the power of the Association to bestow on its members and is awarded to a small number of growers each year for outstanding accomplishment in seed production over a long period of time. Frank Weaver has been a C.S.G.A. member since 1923. His most outstanding accomplishment was the maintenance of stock seed of the Silver King variety of open pollinated corn in the days before hybrid corn came into popular use. Walter Vail, a prominent farmer of Middlesex County,

has since 1934 produced many varieties of wheat, oats, barley and beans and was an elite producer of O.A.C. 21 barley from 1941 to 1950. Frank Marritt has produced registered cereal crops since 1926 and on occasions produced registered field peas and timothy. Mr. Marritt is perhaps best known as a producer of registered wheat and for his leadership in the hot water treatment of wheat for the control of loose smut. All three growers have been consistent seed exhibitors at the Royal Winter Fair and the International Grain and Hay Show.

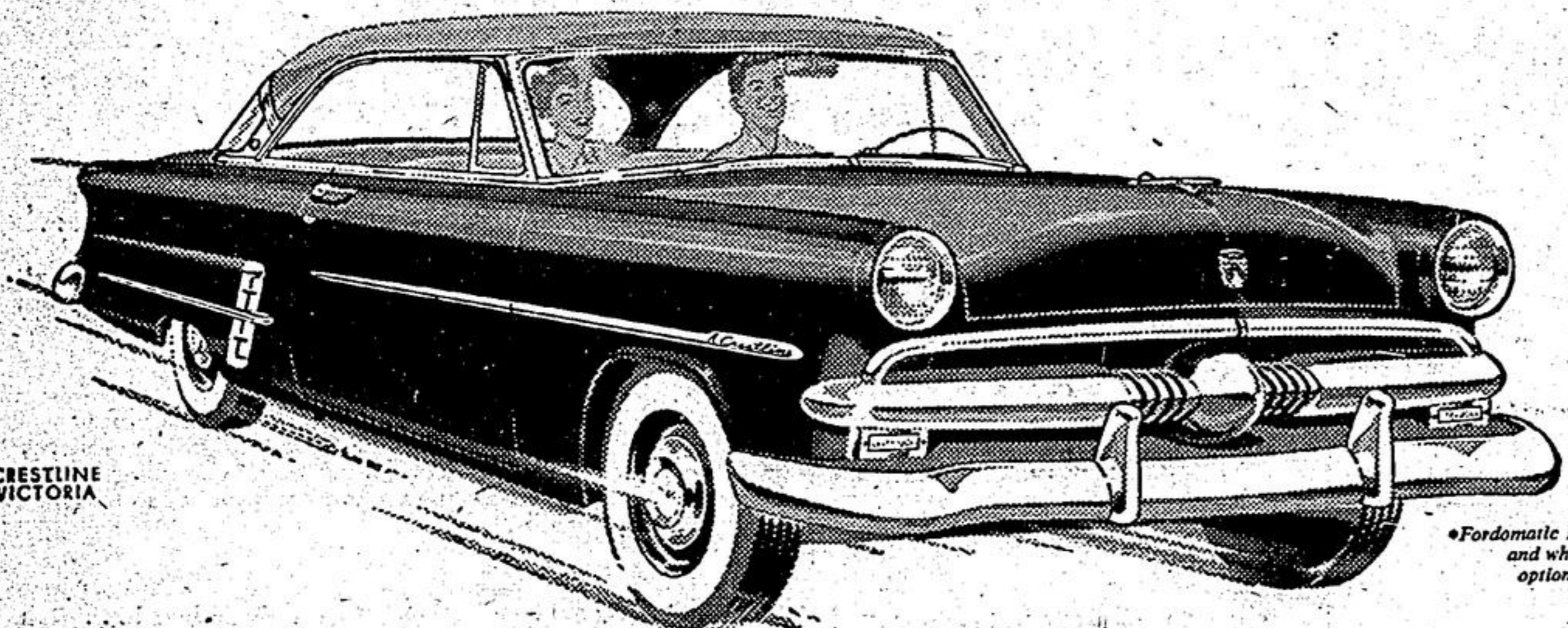

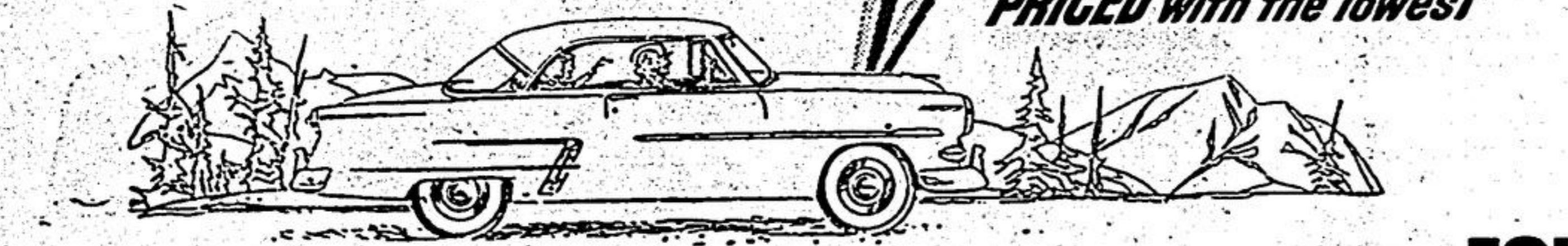
