Oshawa entered the finals after defeating the Stouffville Clippers in four games with one tied.

LLOYD PERCIVAL RECEIVES CORONATION MEDAL

Queen Elizabeth II has approved the award of a Coronation Medal to Sports College and its director, Lloyd Percival, for "contributions made in the field of physical fitness and athletic research." This recognition of Sports College followed nine years of operation as a non-profit sports and fitness research and instruction service in Canada. Founded in 1944, by Percival, "to promote physical fitness, health and sports efficiency," Sports College now has more than half a million members, including athletes, coaches, trainers, teachers, parents and other youth leaders throughout the country. It provides them with the latest techniques and training information gathered from all parts of the world, and in this is guided by a Board of Consultants which includes prominent figures in all fields associated with sports and physical fitness. The facilities of the Sports College are available co-operatively to youth groups, teams and other such organizations interested in promoting sports and physical fitness.

Helen climbed into the sports spotlight a few years ago when she attained a number of awards in speed skating races at Toronto. One need not list the accomplishments of her fiancé. The Maple Leaf centre star was one of the top rookies with Joe Primeau's squad last season and his climb up the hockey ladder has been watched with interest by the entire community. Two other well-known sports figures have vacated the bachelor ranks. Last Saturday, Loring Doolittle, colorful Aurora hockey and baseball star was married to Miss Anne Cunningham of Queensville and on Saturday of this week, big Jack Andrews, now a resident of St. Catharines and ex-defence star with the Newmarket Spitfires will be married to Miss Beverley Kaake of Nobleton.

A SWIMMING POOL FOR STOUFFVILLE?

Through the generosity of many community-minded residents the Village of Stouffville is able to boast of a sports program equal to towns with twice the population. An artificial ice arena, floodlights, tennis courts, bowling green, and ball diamond all add up to a year of complete sporting activities. But there is one project that has not as yet been attempted here, a swimming pool. Without giving the idea much consideration, the individual citizen might believe that such a plan would run into a large sum of money — and so it does. But when you consider the benefits received, the cost is comparatively small. A swimming pool was constructed at Lemonville a little more than one year ago at a cost of \$2,000. On the 5th concession of Uxbridge, north of Goodwood, Mr. and Mrs. Stuart Waits have opened their newly built pool which will provide swimming accommodation for 300 at a cost of \$3,000. This pool was constructed by Mr. Ken Betz of Stouffville. Those children and adults in town who are fortunate enough to spend the summer months on the shores of a lake have no worries when the temperature soars into the high eighties, but the children who are unable to take advantage of a cool summer resort must either journey to some unsupervised stream or stay at home under the nearest shade tree. 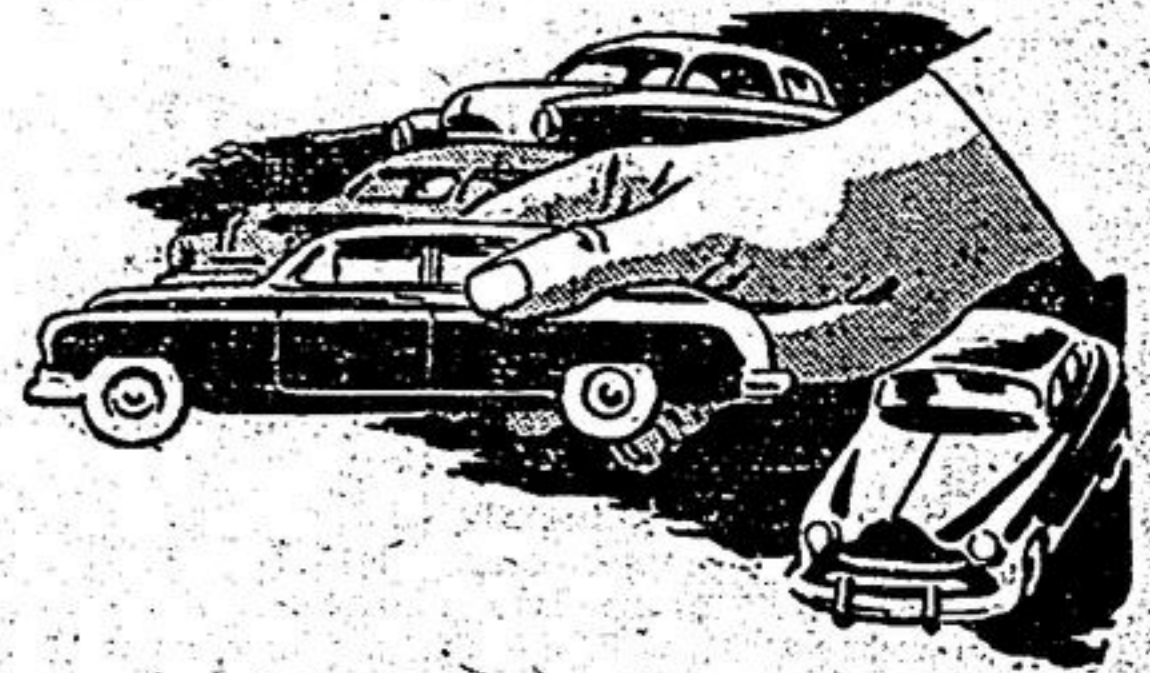
