Mr. Sam, son of a wealthy textile manufacturer, was born in Madagascar but has been living in Paris for the past seventeen years. During their world-wide journey the threesome travelled through such countries as

Switzerland, Italy, Yugoslavia, Turkey, Pakistan, Burma, Japan, U.S.A., Mexico and many other historic places. So far they have been involved in just two accidents; they crashed into a donkey while driving through Pakistan and collided with a three-wheeled vehicle in Japan. No one was injured in either mishap. The trio speak English quite well and are also versed in French, Hindustani, African and some Japanese. The tourists carry a tent in the rear of their foreign model car which they pitch on the ground if no hotels, motels or cabins are conveniently located. Mr. Sam speaks highly of the United States and Canadian governments and our democratic way of life. When he returns home to Paris, the learned traveller intends to write books on his cross-country trip in both the French and Hindustani languages. In this way he hopes to create a better world understanding. When the trio complete their world-wide tour they will have covered a distance of 56,000 miles since March 1952.
