Patterson, this imposing residence occupied a full corner lot and a large brick two-story barn shared the property with the house. Dr. Patterson was a veterinarian and like his successor of later years, Dr. J.T. Storey, conducted a veritable animal hospital in the large brick stable. Race horses were brought there and boarded while their ills were being cured. A few years ago the stable was torn down and this part of the property is now occupied by a fine new bungalow occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Milt Storey. Dr. Patterson, the builder was the father of Mrs. Jos. Winterstein of Stouffville who was born in the house. In later years the house was occupied for varying periods by Mr. Perkins, local merchant, W.J. Stark, a former town reeve, a manager of the Sovereign Bank and finally to Dr. Storey and his family. The house was erected in the elaborate exterior style of a half century ago, with broad verandahs and fancy woodwork like the houses of yesteryears it was also extremely firmly constructed and has a basement wall more than two feet thick.
