### Son of Former Resident Dies In the West

Markham Township friends will regret to learn of the sudden passing in Western Canada, of a son of a former township farmer, Joseph Wideman of Castor, Alberta. Joseph Wideman is a brother of Herb and Wesley Wideman on the 8th con. and he went home-steady to the West over forty years ago. We reprint here an account of Mervin Wideman's passing as taken from the Castor Advance:

"The community was saddened to learn of the sudden passing last week of Mervin M. Wideman, following a severe attack of poliomyelitis. He became ill on Thursday, July 23, but was still able to drive his own car into town the next day for medical aid. However, his condition became progressively worse and on Sunday evening was taken to Edmonton under oxygen, for special treatment. Late Tuesday afternoon he lost consciousness from which he never recovered. He passed away quietly on Tuesday evening, at the age of 32 years.

He was born on Feb. 2nd, 1921, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Wideman of Castor. At the time of his passing he farmed in the Castor district.

He leaves to mourn, his parents, two brothers, Harvey of Bergen Alta., and Allan of Berrymoor Alta., also other relatives and many friends. One sister predeceased him in 1946.

He gave his heart to the Lord when nine years old. His Christian life was a blessing to all who knew him.

Funeral services were held from Gospel Chapel at 2:30 p.m. last Saturday afternoon with Rev. M. L. Baker officiating. Pallbearers were Messrs. David Holloway, Robert Holloway Austin Weeks, Harold Schartz, Ernest Schlenker and Gordon Wetter.
