I thought you might be interested in our reception in Vancouver a few weeks ago. Due I suppose to the publicity in Chatelaine we were accorded quite a reception. Representatives from the Chamber of Commerce were there to meet us, and after giving a very short talk, and offers of any information or assistance we needed, they presented each girl with a map of the city, pamphlets telling them of the points of interest, and a list of the principal activities in that city for that week.

Fortunately the heat wave was over in Los Angeles before we got there. We took a tour of Forest Lawn Memorial Park and saw the famous "Last Supper Window," and the huge painting, "The Crucifixion." The canvas is 180 ft. long and 45 ft. high.

I was visiting friends in Los Angeles, so wasn't with the buses, but the girls had a busy

time touring Hollywood and Beverly Hills. Some took the boat trip to Catalina, and others spent the day on the Beach at Long Beach. They all seemed to enjoy the trip to Mexico.

The last evening was spent at a very interesting place, Knott's Berry Farm. Mr. Knott originally had a very small berry farm which wasn't doing too well. His wife started making berry pies and selling them from a road side stand. Their business expanded until now they have several restaurants and each of the five children have a shop of their own.

We were fortunate that it wasn't too hot crossing the desert. We drove all one night to avoid the heat. Stopped at Las Vegas so everyone could see the colored lights and the night life there. We arrived in Zion last night and it is beautiful here with the towering Red Cliffs on every side. Tomorrow we go to Grand Canyon and will be home to Unionville in less than two weeks. The time seems to have gone very quickly.
