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Stouffville Bylaw Bans Parking Within 15 Feet Of All Intersections

Parking within fifteen feet of any intersection is being banned and signs are to be posted to this effect, it was agreed by Stouffville Council on Thursday evening. Council passed a bylaw authorizing police to enforce the regulation along with a number of other revisions in connection with local traffic.

In addition to the parking regulation governing corners, persons shall not park closer than six feet from any fire hydrant. Making a U-turn on the Main St. is also forbidden.

Saturday Parking

Council has discussed for some time the advisability of curbing the parking of vehicles on Main St. on Saturday evenings for long periods when the occupants were apparently only using the vehicle as a handstand to watch the passers by. Thus there is included in the bylaw a clause which prohibits parking on Main St. between Albert St. and Church St. for more than an hour between the hours of 6 p.m. and 10 p.m. Violation of any of the clauses of the bylaw carries a penalty of not more than \$10 for the first offence and \$25 for subsequent offences.

The local Provincial Police officers or any police or traffic officer is authorized to enforce the bylaw and they shall also obey promptly all signals or orders given by these officers.

Planning Bd. Advised to Study Zoning Problems in Whitchurch

Reeve Fred Timbers brought before the members of Whitchurch Township Council on Saturday the question of whether or not the local Planning Board should be authorized to study zoning problems in Whitchurch. He stated that since the work of the board had lessened somewhat in recent weeks, that they should meet only once a month now on unless Council deemed it advisable to provide with plans for possible zoning.

"I think we should definitely start preparing now and wait until industrial sites built up with houses," councillor McCarron. Councillor Legge expressed the view that while preparation should be made, he was in favor of zoning the land privately, forcing citizens to pay taxes on land which they could only dispose of for industrial purposes and as was council's wish, they should purchase land and hold it. Reeve McLaughlin stated steps should be taken to study zoning.

"It's a very ticklish thing zoning but I think now is the time to give it some thought," said councillor Gra-

Population and Assessment Are Still Climbing

Assessor E.R. Good has just completed the latest assessment of the Village of Stouffville and along with it the vital statistics in respect to the population. The total assessment for purposes of the 1934 tax levy is \$1,064,753. This is an increase of \$51,000 over last year's figure.

Population since last fall has jumped another 110 to stand now at 1,893. At the present annual rate of increase, the population should reach two thousand within the next year or so which is sufficient to give Stouffville "town" status if it so desired.

Greatest amount of assessment is realized on the buildings with \$801,400 being the amount of assessment, \$200,555 for land and \$59,768 for business.

York County Holsteins Tops At the C.N.E.

York County exhibitors showed the Grand Champion bull and the Junior Champion female in the Holstein classes at the C.N.E. The Grand Champion bull was Illehee Sovereign supreme owned by H.C. McCloskey, Queensville. He headed the aged bull class and then went on to the supreme honor state. He will be recalled as the All Canadian three year old bull for last year, also the Reserve Grand Champion at the Royal Winter Fair and the Grand Champion at the York Black and White Day which was held in connection with Markham Fair.

S.B. Roman, King showed the Junior Champion female, she being the first prize Junior Yearling heifer Texal Fond Hope Darkie. Roman also had the first prize milking three year old heifer, the first prize senior heifer calf, the second prize dry aged cow, the second prize senior Get-of-Sire and the third prize graded herd.

The joint entry of L.S. Livingston, Woodbridge and J.M. Fraser, Streetsville was second in the two year old bull class. H.C. McCloskey showed the third prize Junior Yearling bull and the fifth prize milking two year old heifer.

The York county entry was third in the strong county herd class which was won by Peel.

Dr. Hector I Astango, Brampton, Ont. was Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor with his Rosafe entries. He showed the Grand Champion cow, Grenvue Nettie, Gemma and the Reserve Grand Champion and Best uddered female A.B.C. Shamrock Mildred. S.B. Roman, King had the Junior Champion female. Two sons of the four times All-Canadian and \$20,000 Spring Farm Sovereign Supreme were Grand and Reserve Grand Champion bulls, the top award going to the Aged Bull, Illehee Sovereign Supreme owned by H.C. McCloskey, Queensville, who headed the Aged Bull Class and the Reserve Grand to Hunterholme Rag Apple Supreme, the winning two year old for Sherwood, Burlington. Ross Albert G. Hunter, and A.M. Segsworth, Burlington, showed the Junior Champion Bull while the joint entry of D.S. Dunton & Sons Brampton and J.G. Cation Cheltenham was Reserve Junior Champion.

A total of 256 head were shown by 87 exhibitors. Peel won the County Herd Class with Halton second and York third. This was the Championship Holstein show for the ten counties of West Central Ontario. The Judge was Wm. K. Hepburn, Jamesburg, N.J.

Consider New \$45,000 School Fifth of Uxbridge

Three members of the Uxbridge Township Public School area board, Mr. Jack Kidd, Mr. Earl Tindall and Mr. Walter Beach appeared before council at their regular monthly meeting on Monday evening to discuss the over crowded condition in the Fifth Line school. At the present time there are 48 pupils in attendance. The Board members mentioned the possibility of erecting a new school building in the area which would cost approximately \$45,000. Nothing definite was decided however.

Another joint meeting between Whitchurch and Uxbridge Township Councils is to be called in the near future to discuss encroachment by local gravel companies on the townline road. Road Supt Stan Slack informed council that in one particular place the gravel pit had undermined the road to the extent that a hydro pole was now practically left suspended in space. Whitchurch Twp. are to engage an engineer to look into the matter.

A representative from Tuck's Poultry Farm, Uxbridge appeared before council requesting that the members make some provision for fire protection in the area. In the district there is much waste land and a grass fire would be disastrous to buildings if the outbreak got out of control. Uxbridge Township has no bylaw regulating the starting of fires by residents in the municipality.

Whitchurch Concerned Over School Financing

Whitchurch Township councillors meeting in regular session on Saturday afternoon expressed grave concern over the ever increasing rise in school debentures in the township. Reeve McLaughlin stated that the problem was becoming increasingly worse and Whitchurch Twp. could not go on issuing more and more debentures in indefinitely. In addition, he said, grants under the new York County setup would be less than those enjoyed formerly.

Clerk Jack Crawford revealed that the municipality stood to lose between \$12,000 and \$13,000 or about 14% due to arrangements in setting up the new Toronto Metropolitan Area.

The time is coming when we will just have to tell the government how much we're going to pay and no more, and it will be up to them from there on," stated Reeve McLaughlin.

Clerk Crawford told council that when the township debenture debt reached 20% of the total assessment, municipal finances were at a dangerous point. Whitchurch is presently committed to a debt of about 18%.

Reeve McLaughlin told the members that an effort had been made through the Deputy Minister of Education to

have a change in legislation whereby the school grants would remain the same as formerly in "old" York County, but so far the effort had failed. Communication was received from Secretary M. Gilchrist of the Vivian School Section requesting council to prepare debentures for \$40,000 for a new two-room school at Vivian. Tentative approval has been given by the Department for the school which was recently voted in by section ratepayers on a very slim majority. The Board also asked for an advance of \$1,000 on the debentures for the purchase of a school site and the drilling of a well.

The clerk reported that in School section 13 there are 297 pupils this term as against 231 last year and a special meeting is called for this week to deal with the problem at Oak Ridges.

Deputy Reeve Fred Timbers suggested that the township finance committee meet next week to consider the school financing problem and a report be ready for the council meeting of Sept. 24th. Council agreed to the suggestion and added to this resolution the names of Reeve McLaughlin, Councillor McCarron and Clerk Crawford as representatives to the special school meeting for S.S. No. 13.

William Conner's Death Is Sudden

After a very brief illness, William Henry Conner of Stouffville passed away on Tuesday of this week in Wellesley Hospital in Toronto. He was in his 73rd year and had lived retired in town for the past six years.

Will Conner as he was familiarly known to a great host of friends was the only son of Daniel and Adelaide Conner and was born on the home farm which is on the townline just west of Stouffville. In 1905 he married Sophia E. Grove and the couple farmed this familiar acreage until retirement to town. William Conner was weed inspector for Markham Township for a number of years and was widely known throughout the farming fraternity. His farm was always a model of neatness and he was a great lover of animals. The deceased was a member of the United Missionary Church. He was secretary of the Sunday School for some years, served as steward and held other offices, and exemplified the staunch Christian life throughout his years. He

had a keen sense of humour and his ready wit can be attested by many of his friends.

The funeral on Thursday afternoon will be conducted from O'Neill's Funeral Chapel with public service in the United Missionary Church at 2:30. Rev. M. McGuire of Pontiac, Mich. will conduct the service assisted by Rev. F.G. Huson. Interment will be made in the Stouffville Cemetery.

"The room should be cleaned every day," exclaimed Reeve Ogden.

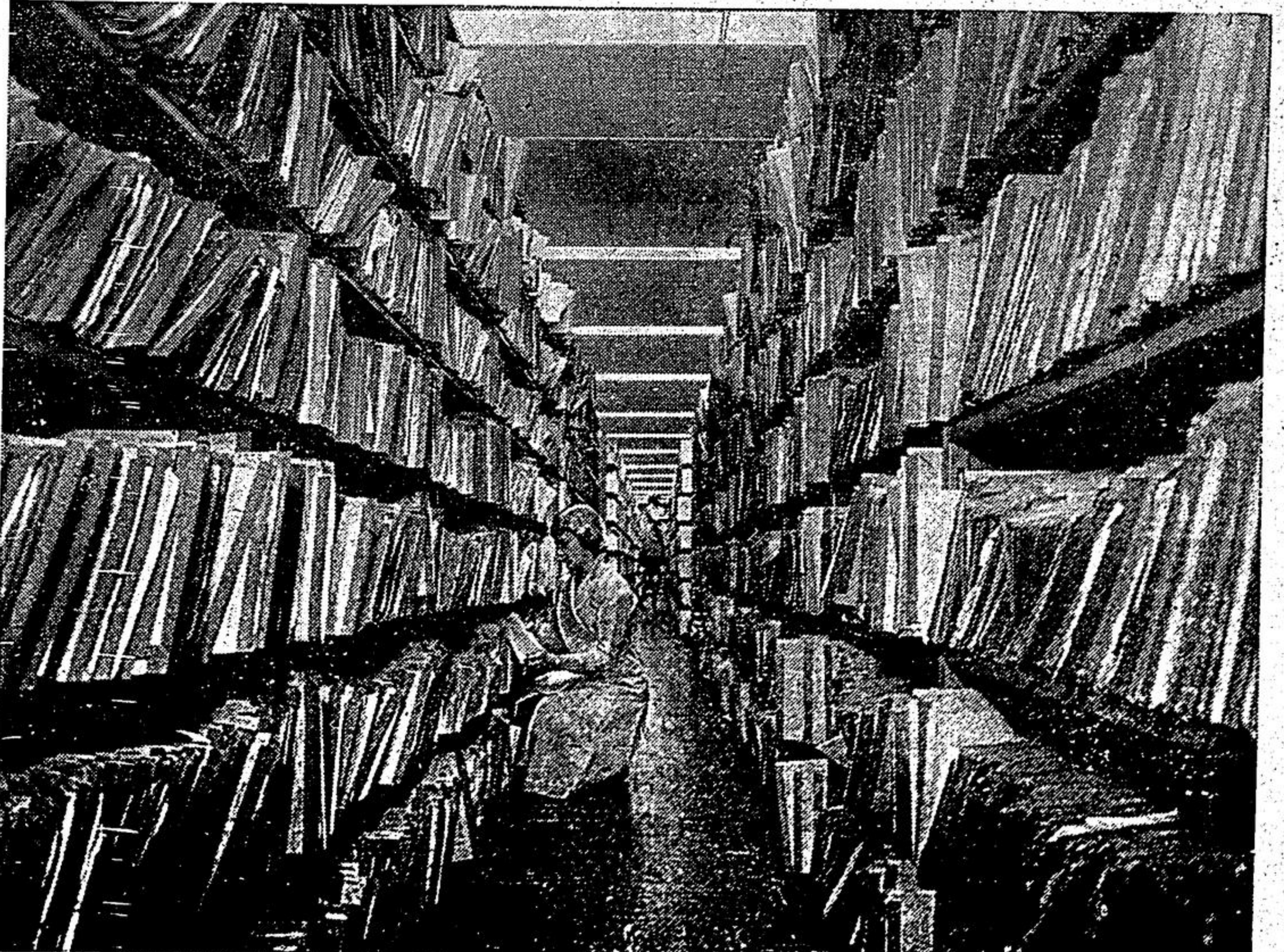
Clerk Garfield Brown said that he would contact the Provincial Police and see if some working agreement could be reached.
