Horticultural Meeting

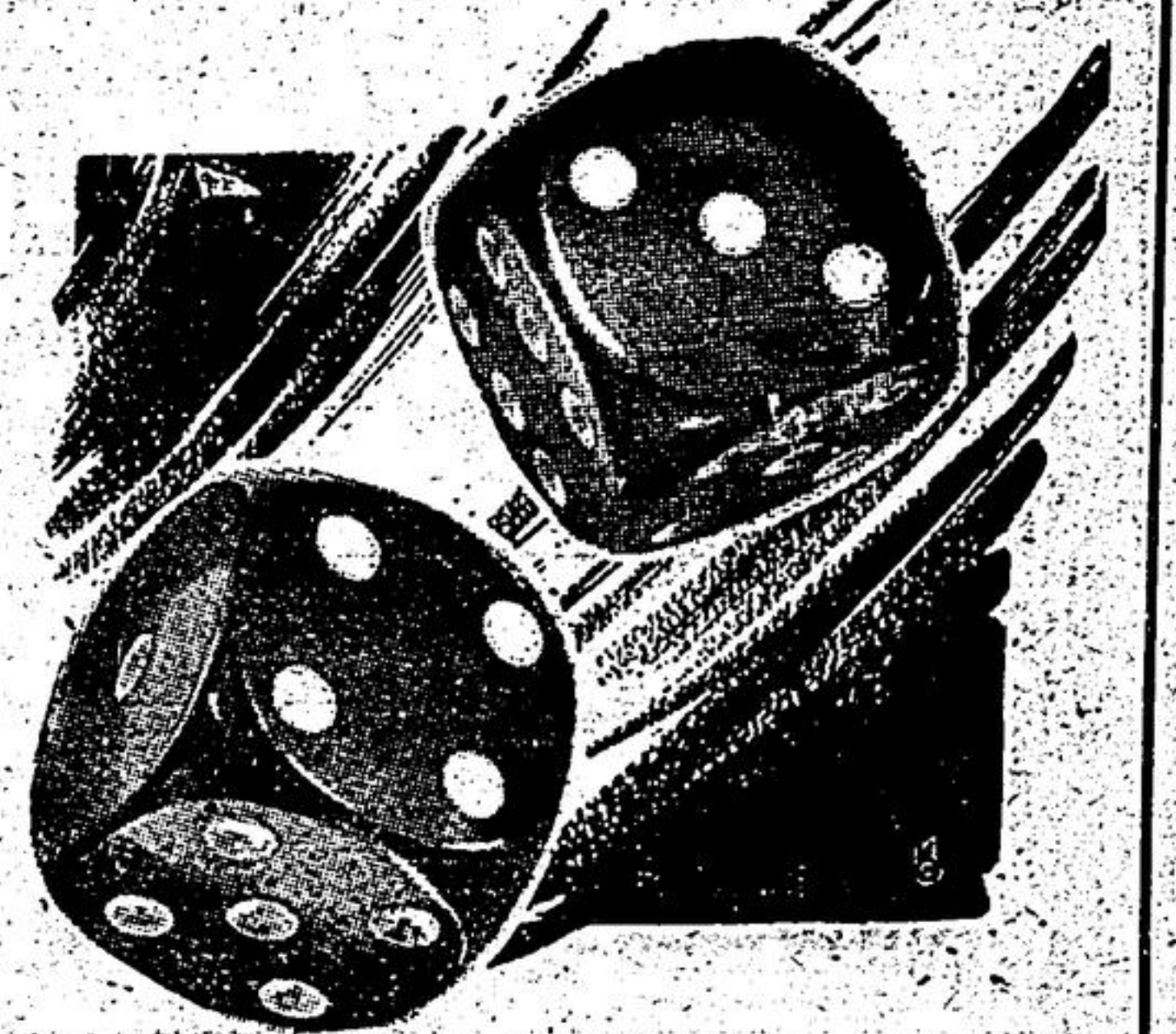
