## Markham Takes Stand for New \$675,000 School

Markham Township has taken a stand supporting the proposal to erect a new \$675,000 High School at Thornhill, the school to be an academic school with practical option courses. Woodbridge which is also in the area has replied that they only favor a straight academic school costing \$540,000 and Richmond Hill has taken a similar stand.

"The \$675,000 school is the most popular with the Markham ratepayers in the area, said councillor Lennie. Councillor Lennie presented the following resolution which was approved: "Whereas the ratepayers of the Richmond Hill High School district who reside within Markham Township have expressed themselves clearly as being overwhelmingly in favour of constructing a school (at an estimated cost of \$675,000) which will offer within its curriculum several practical options; be it therefore resolved that the Council record its willingness to proceed towards the constructing of same."

"We helped build two schools in Richmond Hill, it's certainly not right that they should try and block another corner of the same area from getting just as good a type of school," declared councillor Hooper.

Deputy-reeve LeMasurier suggested that it was a possibility that when Weston was included in the Toronto area next year, Woodbridge students might not be accepted there and if practical option courses were not given at the Thornhill school they would be in difficulty.

"The Woodbridge reeve has told that before," said councillor Hooper.

## Driver Escapes When Loaded Truck Upsets

George Brown of Altona had a miraculous escape from death on Tuesday morning when his loaded gravel truck nosed down a steep embankment at Oriole and crashed into a hydro pole. The cab of the vehicle was completely wrecked.

Brown claimed he was following a car when it suddenly stopped in front of his truck. Rather than smash into the rear of the car, the driver turned the truck into the deep ditch. The hydro pole creased the right front corner of the cab. If the pole had struck the driver's side, Brown no doubt would have been killed. He escaped with a few minor scratches. The truck was the property of T. & H. Haulage of Hamilton.

It was necessary to use a bulldozer and a tow truck to extricate the vehicle from the ravine.

## Muir's 37 Days At Sea On Way to Orient

2 of 35 — 3 Chome, Denenchofu, Ota Ku, Tokyo, Japan.

Dear Stouffville Friends,

We arrived safely in Tokyo on Sunday morning, Sept. 6th, after 37 days on board ship. It seemed a very long time to be at sea, but we had only one very rough day and none of us suffered from sea sickness. There were five typhoons that we had to dodge throughout our journey. The wind at the centre of a typhoon blows at about 150 miles per hour or more, so that a ship could not last very long if it got in one. Our Swedish captain was very careful and we were thankful for a good safe journey. We saw several volcanoes throughout the journey, some of them with a lot of smoke and steam coming out of the top. We enjoyed seeing the work of the missionaries in the three places we stopped in the Philippine Islands. There are many fine Filipino pastors in charge of the churches. The climate is very hot and hard for the missionaries and schools for the children are a problem. We had a two day visit to Hongkong and it was nice to be back in Chinese surroundings again. We compared experiences with the missionaries there and found that the last two workers of our mission had just been released by the Communists.

We were met in Japan by seven or eight missionaries, amongst whom were Dorothy Pape and Janet and Jill. The Papes are trying to rent a house in Tokyo where Bill teaches. He comes down from Karuzawa and stays with us Thursday to Saturday in order to teach his classes here. Our little house is very nice. It has many Japanese features, such as sliding door and windows and we take our shoes off at the entrance to preserve anese bath tub about 4 feet deep and four feet square. The floors. It has a deep Jap-kitchen and bathroom are finished in very good tile work which the Japanese seem to be able to do so well. There are many foreign residences around us with nicely kept gardens. It is quiet and very suitable for study. The boys go to school on the electric train. It takes about 25 minutes and our language school is a bit further on. So far we have enjoyed the study but it will get harder very soon—no doubt. Thank you all for your cards and letters in our recent bereavement.
