

FRISBY ACCLAIMED IN RUGBY VICTORY

Graham Frisby, Stouffville High School's top athlete and football star received high acclaim from Richmond Hill supporters following the local squad's victory over the Yonge Street crew. It marked the first time that Richmond Hill's 6-man football had suffered defeat since the league was organized several years ago. Stouffville captured the game 33-17. The Richmond Hill Liberal newspaper described Frisby as a "ball of fire whose superior speed and drive proved to be the difference between the two clubs." Frisby scored four touchdowns for the winners with Glenn Thompson getting two.

FOOTBALL UNDER FLOODLIGHTS

Another use has been discovered for Stouffville's new floodlight system. On Wednesday. Oct. 28th, the Stouffville High School football team will battle Richmond Hill under the lights. weather permitting. It will be a new experience for the squad who have previously performed under natural lighting conditions. If the plan is put into operation it will mean that baseball, softball and football teams have been able to take advantage of Stouffville's superior floodlight system.

DEFENCE MAKES THE DIFFERENCE

In our first glimpse of the 1953-54 edition of the Stouffville Clippers one major improvement impressed your reporter and the majority of fans who attended the Oshawa-Stouffville exhibition contest - the defence. "Joe" Scatalan formerly with A. V. Roe and MacKintosh from Latimer Brokers in the East York League looked very impressive. Bert Baker was a star throughout the game while Mark Mills, Jim Machin and Les Clark turned in very creditable performances. Last year, fans will no doubt remember the Clippers were woefully weak on defence with playing coach Bob Bangay finding it necessary to drop back on the blueline to fill the vacancy created through lack of players.' The increased rearguard strength may also aid goaltender Blake Eatough in maintaining his excellent goaltending record since donning a Clipper uniform. Despite the shortage of defencemen last season. Eatough was the top netminder in the Sr. 'B' group.

CHAMPION YANKEES RECEIVE \$8,000 CUT

Each member of the New York Yankees who received a full world series share will collect a record sum of \$3,230.68. Those voted full shares by the losing Brooklin Dodgers will receive \$6.178.42. The Yankee windfall, shared by 22 players, manager Casey Stengel, four coaches, the club trainer and road secretary, easily eclipses the previous record payoff of \$6,772.05. pocketed by the world champion Cleveland Indians of 1948. Second place money compares to the \$4,951.03 previous high received by the New York Giants two years ago. The runnersup in the American and National Leagues, Cleveland and Milwankee will receive \$51,850.62 from the gate receipts to divide among its players. When one stops to think over these figures the staggering totals are even beyond one's imagination. Take the Yankees for instance, each player will receive over \$8,000 for one week's work, six games or approximately 18 hours. Their earning for one week compares with the salary of an average business man in two years. Is it any wonder that athletes strive to reach the top rung in the professional ladder.

A NEW RULE

Hockey fans who closely follow the rules and regulations of the game probably discovered that something new had been added to the book as far as Sr. 'B' hockey was concerned. Players may now shoot the puck into the opposition's end zone as soon as they cross the centre ice line and it will not be called for icing. Also a puck shot from outside the blueline across the centre ice line to a player moving in on the defending team's blueline must be picked up by the attacking player and controlled or it will be called back. In the old ruling if a player was in a position to accept the pass even though he didn't touch the puck the play was allowed to continue. The rule which allows an attacking player to shoot the puck into the end zone when he crosses the centre ice line is supposed to speed up the play and decrease the possibility of there being numerous off-sides at the blueline. This rule has always applied in Jr. "A", Sr. "A" and the N.H.L. It is true that no-icing rule might tend to speed up play but there are other unfavorable points concerning this regulation. Players will be more open to injury as they attempt to rush into the corner for the puck as soon as it is shot into the end zone from outside the blueline. It tends to cut down on pretty three-way passing plays from centre ice into the net which were practically necessary under the old ruling. It doesn't take too many brains on the part of a forward to carry the puck to centre ice, then rifle it in the general direction of the opposition net but it does take hockey brains to juggle the puck to the blueline before the player takes a shot. It will be interesting to see how the two rules compare in actual practice and then we may be able to judge whether the rule is a step forward or backward, as far as promoting good hockey is concerned.

IS RURAL HOCKEY DYING OUT? It appears this season that there may be a scarcity of rural hockey teams in this district. Last year an interesting group was formed which included clubs from Markham, Brougham, Peaches, Woodbridge and Agincourt. Following the playoffs each team entered their respective classes in the Ontario Rural Hockey League. Markham and Woodbridge went Senior, Peaches moved into Intermediate 'A' competition and Brougham went ntermediate 'B'. Agincourt were not allowed to enter further cural competition because of an illegal player set-up. Markham aptured the Senior championship with comparative ease, Peaches lost out to Bolton and Brougham was eliminated by Kleinburg. At the present time Markham are undecided as to heir hockey future and Brougham, according to reports, are definitely out of rural hockey. Agincourt are unlikely to enter club in this group and the fate of Woodbridge is as yet unnown. Peaches are still very much interested if suitable competition is provided. The local squad have already held ne practice and a number of promising prospects have been ined up. There has always been considerable rural hockey nterest to the north and east of Stouffville and these clubs night be revived to take part in active competition. Such comnunities as Pine Orchard, Lemonville, Uxbridge, Claremont, Sunderland, Port Perry and Brooklin should easily be able to out a team in a well-organized group. The teams that haven't rtificial ice could play their home games at Stouffville. Port Perry and Whitby are proceeding with the building of new rtificial ice rinks and should be ready for use this winter. If rural hockey club receives the vocal and financial support of ts residents a league could be organized here which would asily pay its way and provide some good hockey entertainment luring the winter months. There are dozens of boys and young nen who are too old for Junior and not capable of entering he ranks of Senior hockey who would welcome with open arms he idea of forming a hockey team and entering an organized roup. Such a plan is worth considering if a local rural hockey eague is to thrive in this district during the coming season.
