Delegation Claims Building Bylaw Being Flouted

A delegation appeared before Markham Township council on Monday evening requesting that some immediate action be taken with regard to an inhabited garage on Briggs Avenue off Yonge Street and a trailer on Bayview which was also being used for the same purpose. The spokesman, Mr. Robt. Castelletti pointed out that since they had appeared before council some six weeks previous nothing had been done. Clerk Hoover informed council that he had presented the Building Inspector, Mr. Ross Norton with a copy of the resolution.

"We should have received a complete report back from the Building Inspector," exclaimed councillor Clark.

Dep. Reeve LeMasurier stated that he had contacted the building inspector on the subject and was given to understand that no one was living in the make shift dwellings. The delegation however were of the opinion that not only were they inhabited but their children were attending the school in the district.

"Such a situation is not fair to the other taxpayers," said the Dep. Reeve.

"Regardless of whether the bylaw has been broken or not our building inspector should have presented us with a report," continued Dep. Reeve LeMasurier.

One member of the delegation stated that they were told by Mr. Norton that Council would not back him up after he submitted a report.

"I want that statement inserted in the minutes," demanded the Dep. Reeve.

"It's not up to us to tell our employees to enforce bylaws," said councillor Clark, "if all these things have to come up before us why do we appoint these men?"

Council agreed that they would investigate the matter and inform the delegation of their findings.

Renew Fire Agreement
Markham Township council renewed their agreement with the Richmond Hill fire brigade at their regular meeting on Monday night. The agreement calls for \$300 standby time and \$50 per call which is an increase over the previous arrangement which called for \$200 standby time plus \$40 per call. Although the motion was passed, Reeve Timbers and councillor Hooper were of the opinion that the Fire Committee should meet with the Richmond Hill council to discuss the increase. Councillor Hooper felt that the present fire area was not satisfactory.

Buttonville W.I. Make Flag Offer
A letter was received from the Buttonville W.I. requesting information with regard to the erection of a flag pole on the site of the new municipal offices. The organization were agreeable to assuming a portion of the cost with the municipality. Council members discussed advantages of erecting the flag from a mast on the office roof or from a pole on the ground. Township engineer, Mr. J.
