Nine Sheep Killed on Farm Near Altona

Pickering Township Council last week paid \$115.00 for nine sheep killed by dogs on the farm of J. O. Spang just south of Altona. Another local farmer, Hugh Gregg also received damages, \$89.04 for five sheep killed on his place on the 9th con. A damage claim of \$35 for sheep was paid Charles Puckrin. Inspection fees amounting to \$25 brought the total month's sheep loss account to \$264.04.

Final Approval Given To Move County Seat to Newmarket

Final approval was given to move the seat of York County to Newmarket by the council at a meeting in Toronto last week. County council headquarters will be moved from Adelaide St. E. in Toronto, on Jan. 1, 1954, to the home of the late Hon. E.J. Davis, Second St., at the north end of Newmarket.

A meeting of a special committee of municipal representatives in the new county held last week, decided by vote that the county seat be moved to Newmarket. The 18 room house on a 22 acre site in Newmarket was offered as a gift to the county by Miss Mabel Davis, daughter of the former county warden of 1884. Value of the property and house has been estimated at \$100,000.

Although the three quarter vote by the 20-odd members of the northern municipalities last week decided the move, the approval of the whole county council was required to make it official. Representatives of municipalities in Metropolitan Toronto, are remaining on county council until the end of the year. After Jan. 1 county council will consist of representatives from municipalities north of No. 7 highway.

Appointed Treasurer J.L. Smith, Queensville, who is clerk of the township of East Gwillimbury and has been tax collector there for 25 years, was appointed clerk-treasurer of the new county at yesterday's council meeting. He succeeds Miss Hilda Merrick who has been county treasurer since 1944. Mr. Smith assumes his duties at the first of the year in Newmarket. A former school teacher, Mr. Smith was one of the applicants for clerk-treasurer.

500 Foot Dock To Be Built at Park By Government

The York County parks committee reported at a meeting of County Council last week that the federal government will build a new 500-foot dock on the county park waterfront at Lake Simcoe next year.

York County park is located on the lake shore east of Sutton. According to the committee report, more than 250,000 persons visited the park this summer. The record day for park attendance was Sunday, Aug. 30, when 2,700 people and 400 cars entered the grounds.

The park was purchased by the county three years ago from a large estate as a recreational area for city and rural residents. It covers 430 acres.

Hello homemakers! Do you recall these facts? Cheese is rich in the proteins and minerals that are so necessary for body building and repairing.

When compared with fresh milk, a one inch cube of cheese represents a glass of milk. Finally, cheese tastes as good with the breakfast toast as the added treat with apple pie at dinner.

Take a Tip
1. Keep a little grated cheese on hand. Place in twist of aluminum foil, then tuck in a covered jar and store in the electric refrigerator.
2. Sprinkle a tablespoon of grated cheese into each baked potato that has been "bursting".
3. Sprinkle grated cheese over each dish of cream soup.
4. Add a few bits of cheese to each baked apple.
5. Crumble old cheese into mashed turnip, pumpkin or squash.

Cheese Cutlets
1/2 cup grated cheese
2 cups mashed potatoes
4 tbsps. chili sauce
1 cup mashed lima beans
1 tsp. salt
Combine ingredients and shape into cutlets about 1/2 inch thick. Sauté in a small amount of fat and serve with celery sauce or hot condensed celery soup. Serves 4.

Cheese Casserole
1 cup soft bread crumbs
2 cups milk
2 eggs, separated
1 cup grated old cheese
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. parsley
1 cup canned peas
Soak bread crumbs in milk for 10 minutes. Stir in the beaten yolk of eggs. Add cheese, salt, parsley and peas. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into buttered casserole. Sprinkle a few dry crumbs on top. Bake in preheated electric oven of 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

Cheese-Crust Pie
3 tbsps. butter
3 tbsps. flour
1 1/2 cups milk
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. mustard
1 can luncheon meat
1 cup canned peas
2 hard cooked eggs
Heat 1 cup milk and stir in a paste made of butter, flour and 1/2 cup milk. Add seasonings, cubed luncheon meat, drained peas and sliced cooked eggs. Pour into casserole (10 x 6 x 2 inches) and top with pastry.

Cheese Pastry: Stir 1/4 cup butter into 1/4 lb. processed nippy cheese. Blend well. Mix in 1/2 cup sifted flour. Press into a ball and chill in wax paper before rolling out as pastry dough for top of meat pie. Prick rolled out dough before fitting on casserole. Bake in electric oven of 400 degrees for 20 minutes.

THE QUESTION BOX
Mrs. J.R.D. asks: How do you cook wild duck?
Answer: If it's mallard duck, stuff with pieces of soft bread, slices of onions and 2 slices of lemon. Refrigerate over night, remove and discard stuffing as it will have absorbed any fish flavour. Wipe the duck with a cloth dipped in vinegar water. Stuff the bird with a mixture of boiled rice and fried bacon bits or sauerkraut. Roast in covered pan for 40 minutes, then uncover and roast another 20 mins. in oven of 350 degs.
Mr. C.B. asks: What can we add to minute rice to induce wild rice flavour and how is the dressing for wood duck prepared?
Answer: If you cannot purchase wild rice, buy brown rice. Boil 1/2 cup brown rice in 1 quart boiling salted water. Drain and rinse in sieve. Meantime, fry 5 slices of bacon, minced and 1/2 cup sliced onions. Then add rice along with 1 minced tart apple, 1/4 tsp. sage and salt and pepper. Spoon into the duck. (Remember you may only shoot 1 wood duck.) Roast in oven of 350 for 1 1/2 or 2 hours. Cover for first 3 minutes.
Miss M.H. asks: Can you advise us how to make croquettes neatly and quickly?
Answer: Keep a saucer of flour handy and dust your hands with it each time you shape meat mixture into a croquette or press mixture gently into cone-shaped drinking cups and turn into muffin tins. Bake in hot oven for 30 minutes.

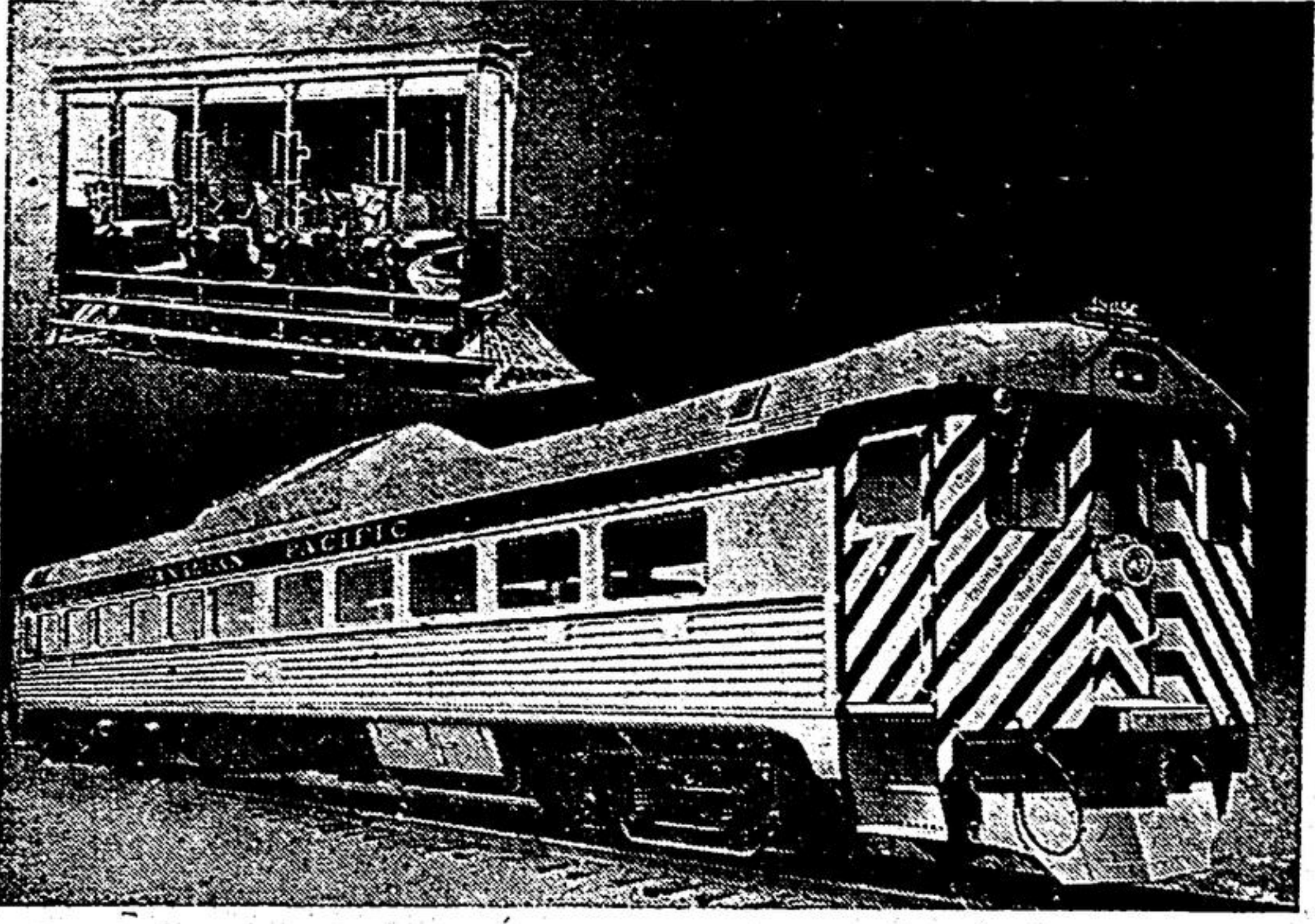
Aurora To Get Brightest Lights

Workmen are installing the last few lights of an \$11,000 street lighting project which, when completed next week will give Aurora one of the most brightly lighted main thoroughfares of any town in the country.

The lights, which are replacing old style lamps on wooden poles will light the street for a distance of two miles. They will be mounted on steel poles set close to the buildings and will be carried over the middle of the road on extension arms.

The lights are of the mercury vapor type and give a steady blue-white illumination. They have been installed in the north and south ends of town and only a short section in the business district remains to be serviced.

This month (November) the C.P.R. is placing in service four of the very latest in self propelled cars, the Budd RDC's. Patterned along "Toonerville Trolley" lines, the old gas-

oline powered, single truck rail car was 13 feet long and carried 14 passengers. Today's 90 foot Budd car carries 89 persons and is air conditioned. Old 502, the first of the breed in Canada, was also air conditioned, but in a primitive sort of way — she had open sides. Unimpressive as the old car was, she can still lay claim to being the

forerunner of the modern, stainless steel, streamlined rail diesel cars which today are providing service between Montreal and Mont Laurier, Toronto and Detroit and North Bay and Angliers. The original rail car, built in 1902, operated from Montreal's old Place Viger Station to Ste. Therese.

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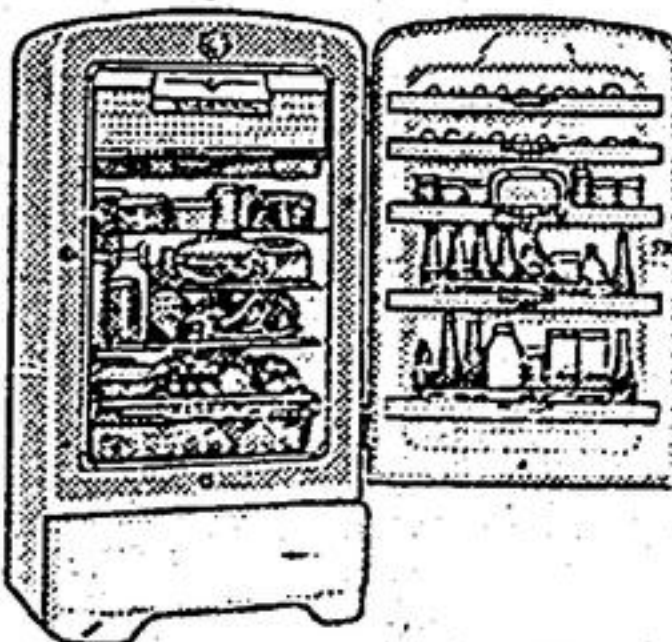

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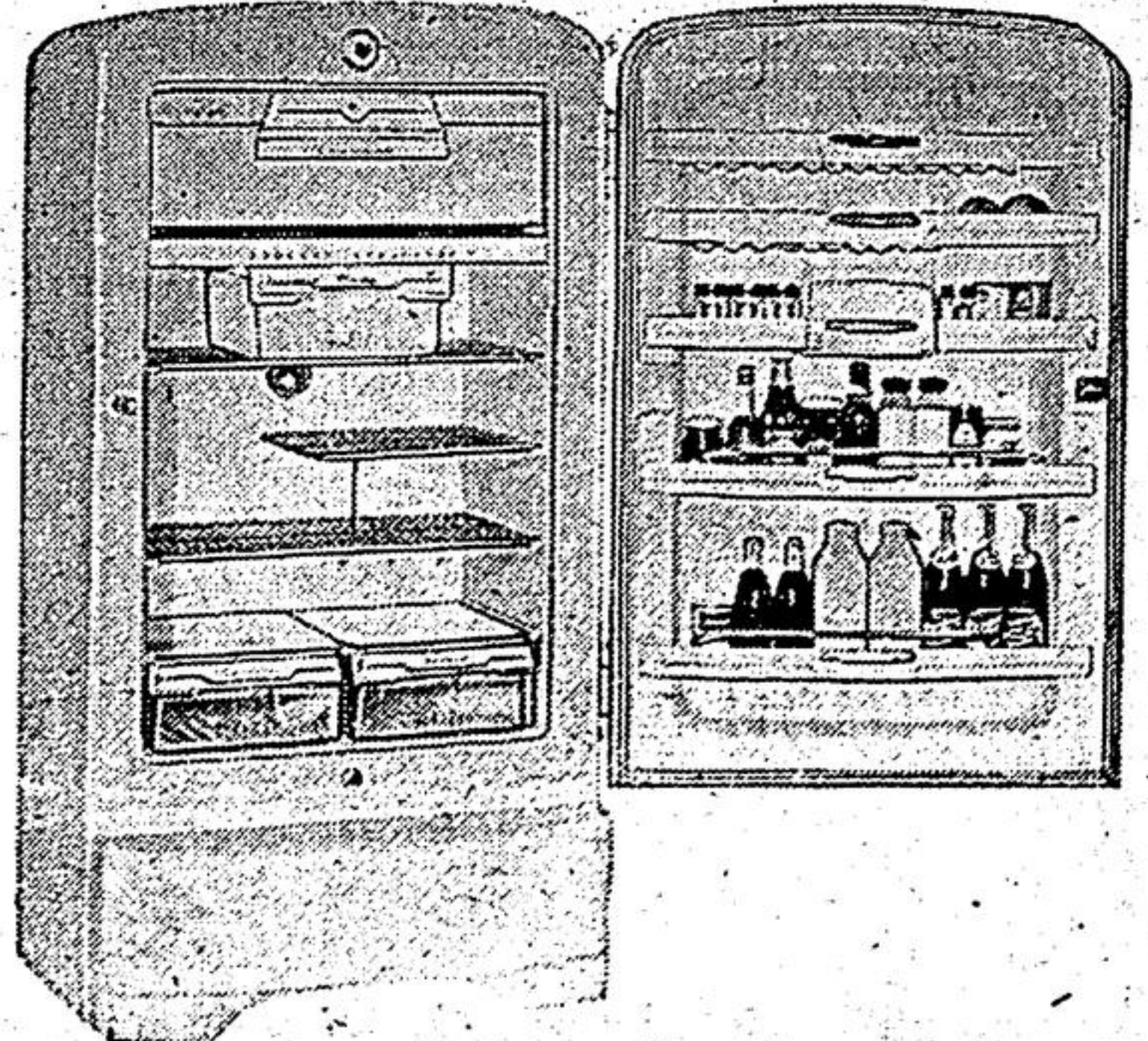
