



Clippers Take First Place with a Double Win During Weekend

OMHA League Practice Fri. Night

Stouffville's Bantam, Midget and Juvenile teams will hold practice sessions on Friday night of this week. All players eligible to play on any of the above named teams are asked to be at the arena at the following times: Bantam, 7 p.m. to 8 p.m.; Midget 8 p.m. to 9 p.m. and Juvenile from 9 p.m. to 10 p.m. Two of the clubs will be coached by Bill Lennox and Don Campbell. A third coach is being lined up. The age limit for Bantam is 14 years and under by Aug. 1st, Midget, 16 years and under and Juvenile 18 years and under.

OVER 120 PLAYERS SIGN UP IN LIONS LEAGUE

The Stouffville Lions Club Hockey League opened its schedule on Saturday morning with all six teams swinging into action for another full season. Although it may be hard to realize, over 120 boys have signed their names to the players' list and more names will probably be added as the season progresses. The large group has been divided up into six teams with the clubs having one hour per game. Fifteen minutes are allowed between games for the boys to warm up with some practice shots on their respective goaltenders. This Stouffville Lions Hockey League has been continuously growing in popularity since first organized three years ago. The town of Newmarket which has a population of over 5,000 people has a similar hockey organization operated by the Newmarket Recreational Commission. It has 22 players ranging in age from 8 to 16 years. The addition of new N.H.L. sweaters for the six clubs has increased the interest in the game. Referees Ron Peake and John Davis officiate throughout the three games from twelve noon on Saturday until four p.m.

THREE TIED FOR SCORING LEADERSHIP

Three players remain deadlocked at the top of the Clippers scoring parade following two weekend games in which the Stouffville squad tallied a total of 15 goals. Ron Bell, Hal Gibson and Frank Stephenson have each collected eight points. Gibson is tops in the goal scoring department with seven while Minton, Bell, Stephenson and Stark have five. NICK BANGAY IMPROVED

Nick received a twenty-five stitch gash on his face and head and five more stitches were added by doctors at the Toronto East General Hospital. In addition to the severe concussion, Bangay suffered a fractured jaw. Bob Bangay, brother of the injured star and Coach of the Clippers said that Nick was forced to stick to a liquid diet and all nourishment must be obtained through a straw. Due to the seriousness of Bangay's injury he was unable to attend the case which was scheduled for Friday. It has therefore been postponed until a later date. Never has there been an episode in this arena that has raised so much ill comment and resentment. The spectators who witnessed the fracas along with those who read of the incident in the press are literally seething over the episode. Nick Bangay has always been one of the most popular players in the Stouffville lineup and fans certainly do not take kindly to any action which might have put a permanent crimp in his hockey career.

Canadians Beat Leafs in Peewee NHL Opener

Montreal Canadiens led by rightwinger Murray Holden scored a 3-1 win over the Maple Leafs in the opening Lions NHL hockey game played in the arena on Saturday afternoon. Holden's first goal came early in the game on a pass from Bill Sanders. His backhand drive caught the top corner of the net before Wilkes in the Leaf cage could move to cover the shot. Midway through the contest, centre Don Tran cleared the puck-out in front of the Leaf cage from the corner and Holden standing at the edge of the crease banged into the twine to give the Canadians a 2-0 lead. The Maple Leafs broke the ice with ten minutes remaining as Gord Johnston raced in from the blueline and lifted the puck over goaltender Todd in the Montreal cage. Todd had previously made two spectacular stops before the puck was finally pushed by him.

In the late stages of the game Holden notched his third tally as he picked up Tran's pass and tapped it into the corner. For the Leafs, Doug Grensted, Earl Thompson and Gary Geer looked good while Holden, Tran, Epworth and McMulen were best for the winners. In the second game, Boston scored a 4-2 victory over Rangers. Ron Hedges was the main cog in the Bruin machine with a dazzling three goal effort. Wayne Redshaw scored the other Boston tally. Bill White and Don Neal were the New York marksmen. In the final contest the Black Hawks upset Detroit 4-2. The Chicago goals were evenly divided among Gary Taylor, Rikkey Wedseltoft, Todd and Redshaw. Gord Tarr and David Smith were the Red Wing marksmen.

Next Saturday the schedule will be as follows: 12:15, Hawks vs Rangers; 1:30, Leafs vs Red Wings; 2:45, Canadiens vs Boston.

Stouffville Clippers took over sole possession of first place in the Metro Senior B hockey league on Saturday night by virtue of an 8-1 victory over the Aurora Lumbermen. The Stouffville goals were evenly divided among the players with Stephenson notching two, Ronnie Bell, Hal Gibson, Joe Scattalon, Geo. Stark, Polly Minton and Gord Lewis potting singles. There were two or three brief flare-ups during the contest with four majors and a match misconduct penalty being handed out by referee Eddie Hodgson. Joe Scattalon and Don Avery became involved in a wrestling bout in the first period and received majors for fighting. In the second frame defenceman Don MacIntosh of the Clippers and Avery of Aurora were banished with majors and in the third period, Milt Cork of the Lumbermen was hoisted out of the game for showering the official with some profane language.

In the goal scoring department, Frank Stephenson put Stouffville into the lead on a pass from Minton with Cork of Aurora in the penalty box. Ronnie Bell made it 2-0 at 8:40 on passes from Lewis and MacIntosh before the Lumbermen counted their one and only tally. Davidson scored with Stouffville playing two men short.

Hal Gibson, Stouffville's flying forward took a pass from McNeil at centre, skated hard into the corner, fell, got to his feet, regained the puck and backhanded the rubber into the corner of the net for the Clipper's third tally. With Stouffville playing a man short Joe Scattalon retrieved a loose puck at centre ice and skated in to deposit the puck in the twine to end the scoring in the first stanza. Geo. Stark netted Stouffville's fifth goal at 3:50 of the second period on quick relay passes from Ronnie Bell and Gord Lewis and Polly Minton made it 6-1 from MacIntosh and Stephenson. With but five minutes remaining in the period, Gord Lewis rifled a bullet drive into the open corner from Small and Stephenson roched the final goal of the game from MacIntosh.

The Clippers could easily have run the score into the double figures as they dominated the play throughout the game. Ronnie Bell and Frank Stephenson both bounced the rubber off the post when they had the goaltender at their mercy.

Clippers Down Lyndhursts 7-6

Stouffville Clippers scored an important 7-6 victory over Lyndhurst Motors on Friday night to vault themselves into a first place tie with Gregg Currie's East York squad. Hal Gibson was the main driving force for Stouffville notching three of his clubs seven goals. It marked the second straight loss for Lyndhursts in the week.

At the end of the second period Stouffville led 4-1 with Gibson, Jerry Junkin, Bill Melville and Ken McNeil blinking the light for the winners.

Lyndhurst Motors put on a strong rally early in the final frame scoring five goals in eight minutes. Ex-Boston Bruin, Bill Shill, Geo. Sayliss, Johnny Petro, John Scott and Don Couch were the marksmen.

Lyndhurst defenceman, Tommy Campbell set a record in penalties in the second period as he sat in the cooler for 20 minutes. He was penalized with two majors and a 10 minute misconduct.
