Uxbridge Township Reeve and Deputy In by Acclamation

(continued from front page) Education will see fit to change back to the old system of separate boards.
Reeve Catherwood spoke briefly on municipal and county affairs pertaining to Uxbridge Township. He told his listeners that the municipality was in sound financial standing with no outstanding debenture debts in the township. The Reeve spoke of the new \$10,000 bridge constructed at Sandy Hook which it was expected would be taken over by the County. Some two miles on the 5th concession north of Clarendon will be resurfaced by the County with work to commence immediately.
Dep. Reeve Stewart Ball also dwelt mainly on county work. He pointed out some of the expenditures over which the members had no control. The construction of Fairview Lodge, \$65,000 for Children's Aid, \$23,000 for welfare purposes and \$13,000 for the Clerk-Treasurer's Dept. and staff. Dep. Reeve Ball noted that the County rate had risen 2 mills during the past year mainly due to the large building program being carried out. He stated that such construction was forced on the County and built to government specifications.

Mr. John Ball, the senior member on Council discussed some of the main items that were mainly responsible for the increase in the Township tax rate. Marked increases were noted in relief, police protection, road department, public and high school and the County Levy. Fire costs were down somewhat over the previous year.
Clarence Bunker, councillor for the past two years touched on some of the improvements that had been made in the township. New sidewalks had been completed at Goodwood, numerous hills had been cut down and a new bridge was constructed at Sandy Hook. Councillor Bunker stated however that many roads were in a bad condition mainly due to the lack of proper equipment.
Councillor Earl Dowswell mentioned the police costs as one item he believed could be lessened. He stated that the mileage expenses appeared unusually high and unnecessary. He felt that a firm agreement should be made with the Stouffville brigade in order to satisfy both parties. Mr. Dowswell pointed out that the Goodwood park fence had been painted and the grass cut. He also stated that considerable brush had been cut throughout the township.
The Public School Area Board system was thoroughly discussed and aired at the meeting. All the members, Eldred Catherwood, Wm. Hewlett, Walter Beach, Earl Tindall and John Kidd expressed their views on the subject. With the exception of Mr. Kidd, all requested the ratepayers to give the system a fair chance to prove its worth.

Both Mr. Catherwood and Mr. Hewlett felt that a vote taken "on the spur of the moment" would not give a satisfactory decision. Mr. Hewlett pointed out that although public school expenses had increased during the past three years that increase was considerably lower than any other public service paid for by the ratepayers. In answering the charge of negligence, Mr. Hewlett stated that a number of schools had only a small amount of money spent on them in the past three years mainly because they were in good condition when the Area Board was formed. Mr. Catherwood explained that a new school built in a section would not burden the taxpayer when government grants were received and the debenture spread over a ten year period. The Board felt that many didn't understand the issue and therefore didn't realize what they were voting for.

Bill Masters, nominated for council stated that he believed the present council was suffering from a bad case of disorganization.
Robb Campbell, another council nominee said he believed his legal training would be of value to council.
Archie Little, nominated for council expressed the belief that council should have representation evenly divided throughout the township.
