

## York Soil and Crop Annual

Speaking on the subject of "Trends in Grassland Farming" at the annual meeting of the York County Soil and Crop Improvement Association in Newmarket on January 6th, Dr. F.S. Nowosad of the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, pointed out to some 350 farmers present that the trend is to use less complex seed mixtures and mentioned some species of grasses and clovers that can well be dropped from hay-pasture seedings. On the same program, Professor L.R. Webber of the O.A.C. Guelph, reported on actual soil conservation results already obtained on farms which pioneered in farm planning under the Soil Advisory Service of his Department, in co-operation with the local Agricultural Representatives. Both speakers answered many questions from the members, following their splendid addresses.

The morning session, following the business meeting, featured a quiz panel on "Tillage Operations," presided over by Harold Clapp of Concord, with the panel consisting of Harold Wright, Agricultural Engineering Fieldman, O.A.C., J.D. Lanthier, Eugene Lemon and Alfred Bagg. Colored pictures were shown by Secretary W.M. Cockburn of the Association bus trip to Ottawa and other points.

## Hospital Fund A Third Subscribed

Ajax, Jan. 7.—The campaign goal of \$60,000 for the Ajax and Pickering Township General Hospital building fund campaign has passed the one-third mark with a month's campaigning still to go.

Chairmen of the fund announced today that \$22,000 has been subscribed by residents and industry in the drive to open a 31-bed general hospital to serve this fast-growing area.

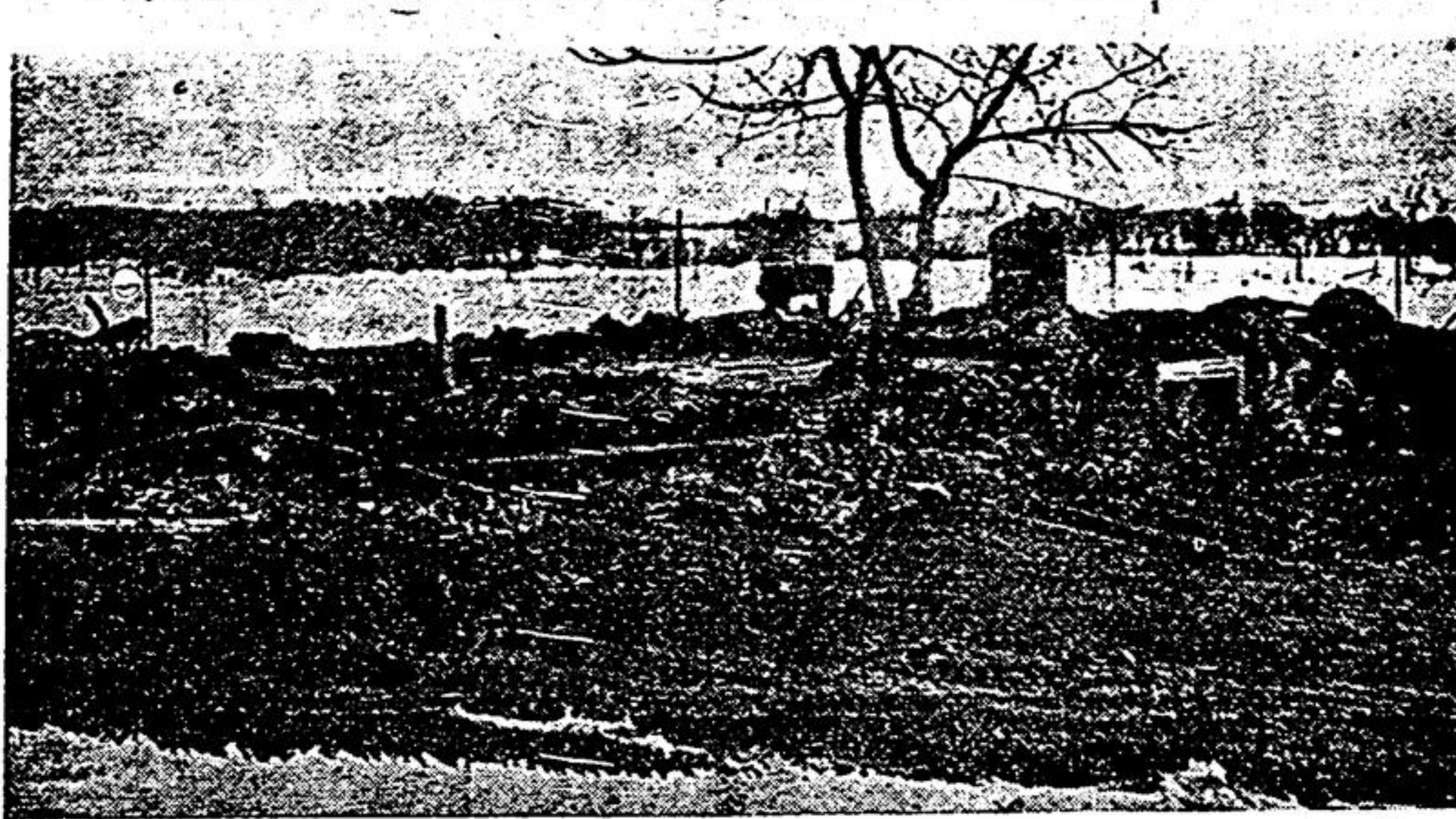
When the \$60,000 figure has been reached the hospital will then be eligible to receive further government and municipal grants.

Helping to keep enthusiasm for the new hospital at high pitch the Pic-Ax follies, a variety revue with a home-grown cast, has put on three benefit performances in different auditoriums in the area. More than \$1,500 was raised this way.

Officials believe the hospital will be opened at the lowest cost per bed of any small hospital in the country in the past five years. Cost per bed will be under \$5,000. Careful budgeting has been responsible for this low figure which contrasts with the national average cost of small hospitals of \$8,000 to \$10,000.

The new Board of Directors met to elect their officers under the chairmanship of retiring President Carl Boynton of Woodbridge. Eugene Lemon of Stouffville was the unanimous choice for President for 1954 and Walter Reesor of Markham, Vice President. Agricultural Representative, W. M. Cockburn of Newmarket was again appointed Sec. Treas. Three Directors, Edwin Marritt, Duncan Watson and J.D. Lanthier, along with the officers and past president constitute the Executive Committee and will serve as the Seed Fair Committee. It was announced that the annual Seed Fair and Bacon Show will be held at Newmarket on Friday, March 19th.

## JOSEPH FORSYTH HOME SWEEP BY FIRE



A mother and her four children fled barefoot into a 20-below-zero cold Monday as an explosion and fire destroyed their farm home north of Greenbank.

Mrs. Elsie Forsyth was preparing breakfast on an electric stove when she saw smoke pouring from an oil stove nearby. Her husband, Joe, had lighted the oil space heater before he went out to pick up the family car which was at a service station a short distance up the

road. Joe Forsyth is a son of Chas. Forsyth, 10th con. of Whitchurch.

Running upstairs, Mrs. Forsyth awakened Darcy, 6, Joseph Jr., 4, and Paul, 3, and told them to run outside. She then carried Karen, 1, to join them. The four children, shivering in night-clothes, stood in their bare feet while Mrs. Forsyth went back to call fire departments at Uxbridge and Port Perry.

On her way out again, an explosion, which rocked the burning house, knocked her down. All the windows were blown out.

The six-room home was burned to the ground in 40 minutes. Mr. Forsyth drove up too late to do anything, and the family watched from the car as the house and all their possessions, valued at more than \$7,000, disappeared in smoke and flame. Neighbors sheltered them.
