Hundreds of friends paid a final tribute to Andrew Penny of Markham who passed away on Saturday at his Albert St. home. Mr. Penny was in his 71st year.

Born in Scarborough Township at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Penny the deceased farmed for a number of years near Box Grove and also on the Markham Road for over twenty years. For a time he operated the Case implementation agency in Markham. He has been a permanent resident of the village for the past five years. Although the late Mr. Penny had been in ailing health for some time, his death came as a shock to his many friends.

MOTOR VEHICLE SALES DOWN

FROM 1952 TOTAL

Sales of motor vehicles totalled 436,817 during the first 11 months of 1953, although a downward trend that started in September continued in November.

The Bureau of Statistics says the November total was

28,140 vehicles with a retail value of \$71,749,138 compared to 32,176 sold for \$78,915,833 in the corresponding month of 1952.

Sales during the January-November period brought \$1,097,879,034 compared to a retail value of \$940,250,400 for 375,529 vehicles sold in the first 11 months of 1952.
