Of course the entire team has not been playing up to its usual form and in such cases the onus usually falls back on the club's last remaining unit of defence — the goaltender.

Clippers Bog Down, Leaside Wins 8-3

The Stouffville Clipper attack bogged down on Wednesday night as Leaside romped to a comparatively easy 8-3 victory. The Clippers showed signs of a rally in the final frame but their offensive petered out when they ran into a flood of penalties. Bert Baker notched Stouffville's first goal with a long blueline backhand on a pass from Haddleton. With Baker serving an interference penalty Norm Dowdall put the Leasiders out front to stay. With Baker still in the box Jim Casburn made it 4-2. When there was less than a minute remaining in the second period Small handed the puck to Sinclair parked in front of Eatough. The Leaside centreman made no mistake with a quick shot.

Stouffville roared to the attack early in the third session and cut the Leaside lead as Geo. Stark scored from Bell and Minton. Midway through the period the penalty parade started and all hopes of the Clippers pulling the contest out of the fire flew out the window. With Scatolon off, Sinclair notched his second goal and Pork McDougall's shot caromed in off Eatough's stick to lengthen the visitor's lead. Sullivan completed the route with the eighth Leaside tally at 12:42.

Norm Dowdall of Leaside was badly shaken up when crashed into the boards by Clipper defenceman Joe Scatolon. He was given first aid treatment at the arena and x-rays were later taken. On Saturday night of this week, Newmarket Spitfires will make their first appearance of the season on Stouffville ice.
