Delegation Present Petition Asking for Ban on Pig Feeders

A delegation appeared before Markham Township Council on Monday evening and presented a petition, signed by 80 per cent of the land owners on concessions 7 and 8 requesting that Mr. J.M. Thompson be banned from swill-feeding pigs on his premises. The petition declared that the above named pig-feeding establishment was an offensive nuisance to neighboring residents in addition to deteriorating the value of the property and reducing the assessment of the effected farms. Mr. Frank Robb acted as spokesman.

Dep. Reeve Clark informed the delegation that the Clerk would be instructed to place the signed petition in the hands of the Township solicitor as soon as possible.

Mr. Donald Matthews, Victoria Square appeared before council and voiced his objection to being charged half the costs by fence viewers concerning a complaint over a fence made by his neighbour.

Mr. Matthews stated that he definitely did not intend to pay any part of the costs involved. Clerk Hoover informed council that in such cases if either party was dissatisfied an appeal must be registered within six days. The decision was made in 1952 and the costs billed to the parties concerned last year.

Mr. Matthews stated that he was not familiar with the law regarding such matters. Reeve Alf LeMasurier stated that it was a Provincial law over which the council had no control.

Council decided to contact Mr. C.E. Bosland, Newmarket, Bell Telephone supervisor in an effort to speed up the switch board connections in the new township offices. It was also decided to provide Chief Constable Clarence Wideman with a private line.

Councillor Art Lennie, Chairman of the police committee suggested that Constable Geo. Clayton be appointed school attendance officer for the ensuing year. The Police Committee were authorized to investigate the setting up of a dog pound to serve the municipality.

The salary of solicitor J.D. Lucas was increased from \$2,000 to \$2,400. It will now be possible for township employees to go directly to the solicitor for advice on all matters pertaining to their individual departments. The tender was accepted to provide venetian blinds for the windows of the new township offices at a cost of \$495.00. It was the lowest tender submitted.

A former warden of Ontario County charged Tuesday that the provincial committee on penal reforms wanted to transform jails into hotels.

Heber Down, Brooklin, last year's warden, told county council: "If the committee is going to make jails like the Royal York Hotel, then God help Ontario County."

Three other former wardens joined Mr. Down in criticizing the committee for its attack on the county jail here during a summer inspection.

Lynman Gifford, Oshawa, said he was flabbergasted when he read of the committee's report.

"I wonder if they are going to make martyrs out of those who get into trouble?" he asked. "That's the last thing that should be done. If they are going to make martyrs of these men, we will have to build bigger institutions."

Thomas Harding suggested the committee was travelling about in the Dark Ages and Ferguson Monro suggested that present jails suit the purposes for which they were built.

Garnet Wilson, reeve of Cannington was elected warden on the first ballot at the inaugural meeting. He defeated Reeve John Sweetman of Scugog Township.
