continued expansion of hous-Mr. Winters, the Minister in charge of the new housing legislation, in his statement said that he felt the present sources of mortgage money were not likely to be sufficient to support a housing program equal to or greater than the 1953 volume. The main object of the legislation is to broaden the supply of mortgage money by making that form of investment more attractive, increasing the number of lenders and making more funds available

for mortgage lending. It is proposed to reduce the down payment from the 20% now required under the National Housing Act. The amount of the loans will be 90% of the first \$8,000 and 70% of the balance of the lending value, subject to maximum loan limits as will be determined by the Order in Council. For a \$10,000 house, for example, a down payment under the proposed arrangements will be \$1,400, as compared to \$2,000 under the present legislation.
