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## Killed by Train Enroute to Young Peoples Meeting Here



When a CPR passenger train sliced in two a car on Thursday, Arthur Embury, 22, of Agincourt was fatally injured and passed away in hospital on Saturday morning. Donald Hunt, 18, his companion in the car was hurled from the car and will recover from her injuries. Both young people were on their way to Stouffville for an executive meeting of the Toronto East Rural Presbytery Young Peoples' Union.

The accident occurred at the level crossing on the fifth concession near here. Embury tried to stop for the train but his car skidded on glare ice, Miss Hunt said. "I saw Arthur apply his brakes but the car seemed to gain momentum," Miss Hunt said. "The next thing I saw was the light of the train right on top of us." "I don't know how it happened but there was a crash. I was standing beside the track and the train was roaring by. I screamed and screamed but the train kept rushing on. Then some people came a-

long and put me in a car," the girl related. Herbert Fuller, engineer of the Montreal bound train, saw the car was not going to stop and applied his emergency brakes. The train crew pulled Embury from the wreckage and wrapped him in a blanket while awaiting an ambulance. A memorial service for Arthur Embury was conducted by Rev. G.A. Beatty in the Agincourt United Church on Sunday. Embury who was an assistant dispatcher at the CPR station there was planned to enter the ministry.
