LOCAL OPTOMETRIST RECEIVES DIPLOMA IN CHILDREN'S VISION

The Optometrical Association of Ontario, in conjunction with the College of Optometry has announced the results of examinations held following



the postgraduate course on Children's Vision held last summer in Toronto. Garnet V. Gray, Optometrist, Uxbridge and Stouffville, was one of five candidates whose papers achieved distinction. The course, which was held to provide intensive postgraduate training in the problems associated with children's vision, was attended by more than one hundred Canadian and American Optometrists. This postgraduate training is part of the educational program of the Optometrical Association of Ontario, of which Mr. Gray is a member.

United Church Here Administers To Over 400

Membership in the Stouffville United Church has climbed over four hundred with 368 families on the roll, according to the report of the annual congregation meeting held Wednesday evening. Rev. Douglas Davis in speaking of his work during 1953 told the gathering that he had officiated at thirty baptisms, 21 weddings and 21 funerals.

One of the greatest strides in the year's church work was made in the Sunday School. Some three thousand dollars was expended in modernizing and enlarging the Sunday School rooms and the average attendance is more than one hundred and twenty-five each Sunday. Largest turnout was around the two hundred mark. The church's financial picture it was revealed in a preliminary financial statement, was remarkably bright with total receipts for the year amounting to \$13,896.53. In addition

to this amount, the church raised approximately \$2,500 for missionary and maintenance work. The National Training School also received contributions of \$377.67; the Ontario Temperance Federation, \$219.03 and the Lord's Day Alliance \$93.05.

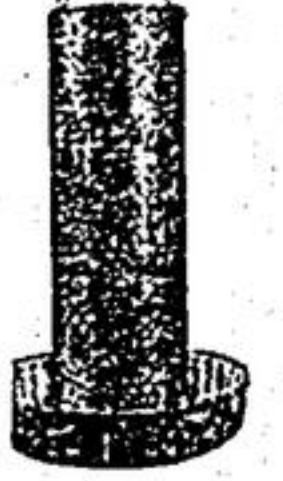
Cottagers Case Adjudged to February 16th
