CEDAR GROVE

"Every man his own historian" — from manuscript to museum — was the topic under discussion in Cedar Grove schoolhouse on Monday evening. In his interesting and enlightening talk John S. Moir of Toronto stressed the human interest in history and drew attention to the fact that as opposed to other sciences, history suffers because it is too commonplace. He spoke of manuscript history, oral history and silent history and of the importance of yesterday's records in the progress of today's culture.

In speaking of the enemies of paper he gave the collectors present some very practical tips for the preservation of their precious old manuscripts and surprised some by telling of the harmful effects of such useful new inventions as cellulose tape and present day ink. An old fashioned art gum or plain bread crumbs seem to be the most effective cleaning agents for old papers and starch or gauze the best preservatives for use by the amateur historian.

At the conclusion of Mr. Moir's informal address he answered many questions and lead in discussions on such pertinent subjects as the restoration of old sites and the formation of local museums. It was an evening to further the interest of the ardent historian and to whet the appetite of the novice.
