Markham Preparing New Hog Bylaw

W.F. Riley, solicitor appeared before Markham Township council on Monday and asked that council repeal their Transportation Bylaw which prohibited the hauling of garbage on township roads. The request arose through council's attempts to curtail the keeping of hogs in an alleged unsanitary condition on the 8th con. and which had raised the ire of a number of residents there.

Only recently Messrs. Frank and John Robb led a delegation before council presenting a petition to ban the Thompson swill feeding establishment on the 8th con. Solicitor Lucas told council that such a petition had no legal ability to do what the petitioners wished to do. He further stated that the township could be zoned to restrict the keeping of hogs but could not discriminate against any particular individual. He also said that there were means of regulating the keeping of swine in a defined area and council agreed that their solicitor should proceed along this line in preparing a new bylaw.

The matter of prohibiting dogs running at large also came up for discussion and Mr. Lucas was requested to prepare a bylaw to restrict these dogs in the area of the 1st concession south of No. 7 highway and from the Richmond Hill boundary to the Jail Farm property.
