To cover all phases of hog producing and marketing, a panel has been set up to discuss the hog marketing scheme, commercial feed, hog feeding and problems in breeding and management.

Following the free lunch, each township group will elect its committee and director before reconvening. The afternoon program will include 2 addresses on most important subjects. "Swine Diseases" will be discussed by Dr. W. R. Mitchell of the Ontario Veterinary College, Guelph and Mr. C.D. Black will report on the "Hog Marketing Scheme" now in effect in Ontario.

Uxbridge To Amend Building Bylaw

This motion was passed following statements by a council member that the township building bylaw contained too many loop holes.

Building Inspector, John Ashenhurst stated that it was impossible to frame a building bylaw without some holes in it.

"We'll need a Philadelphia lawyer to draw it up," commented Reeve Ball.

"Too many people are paying \$40 taxes and loading our schools," countered councillor Earl Downswell. Councillor Downswell also stated that he believed the bylaw should be requested from the owner to be returned to him when his building was completed to the satisfaction of the inspector. This insertion failed to pass and was removed from the motion.

"If a fellow can't afford a \$100 deposit he's got a poor chance of building himself a home," added councillor Downswell.

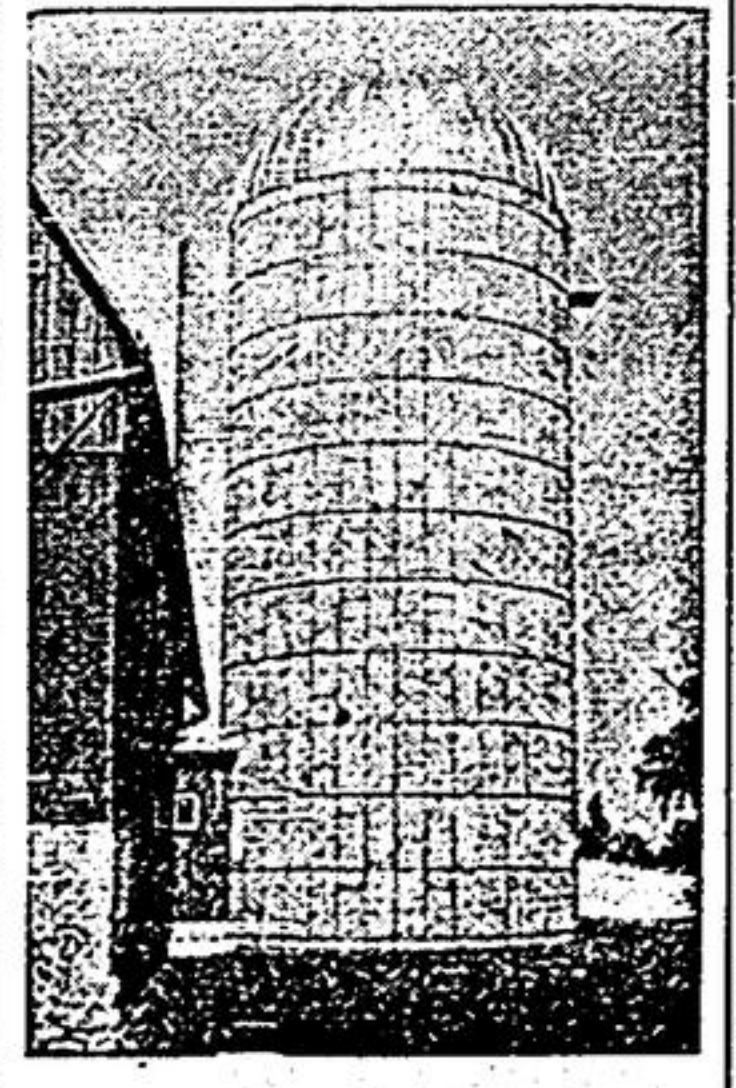
