### Couple Married For Sixty Years

Mr. and Mrs. Peter Brillinger of Gormley celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary on Saturday, Feb. 6th at their home. Mr. Brillinger was born on a farm west of Bethesda, now known as the Fox Farm, on Jan. 27, 1869 while Mrs. Brillinger who is a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Shaffer was born on the farm south of Bethesda, now owned by Mr. Oran Fretz. They were married on Feb. 6, 1894 at the Presbyterian Parsonage in Aurora by a Rev. Mr. Amos. Mr. Brillinger who is now 85 years of age has been confined to his bed following a stroke in April, 1952. Mrs. Brillinger in her 85th year is in fairly good health. She recalls how they drove with horse and cutter from her home at Bethesda to Aurora for the wedding ceremony, and from there to Newmarket for a three day honeymoon. On their return the couple settled on the fourth concession of Whitechurch on the farm now owned by Mr. Kays. Later they moved to Bethesda where they lived for two years, then back to the farm again. In 1913 they purchased the farm in Gormley owned by the late John Baker. Here Mr. Brillinger was active in farming until his illness two years ago. The couple have one son Roy with whom they live, and seven grandchildren, Vera of Richmond Hill, Velma in South Africa, Ross and Mildred in Toronto, Jean, Walter, and Eldon at home.

### EDITOR'S MAIL

Pickering, Ontario

The Editor,  
 Dear Sir,  
 I have been asked why I appear as a defendant to the current proceedings, to set aside the recent Pickering Township Election in view of the fact that I publicly went on record at the Inaugural Meeting as demanding the resignation of the whole Council as illegally elected.

I had always hoped that Pickering Township would elect a Council which would truly represent the interests of the entire Township, and not any regional, social, political or occupational group.

However my own observations over the past three elections convinced me that under the regime of the "Old Guard" such an election was not unlikely but impossible due to the general unethical as well as careless manner in which the Pickering Township Municipal elections have been conducted.

I feel that we must all jealously and sincerely safeguard the sanctity of all elections and see that they are conducted according to both the rules and the underlying spirit of the rules. If, in my opinion, the same procedures were permitted at Federal and Provincial levels as took place in the Pickering Township Municipal Election, we would have virtually set up a totalitarian state in this fair Dominion of Canada.

It is too often thought that a Municipal Government is the last link in the chain of Government, it is not the last but the first link, the root and not the branch; spending literally billions of our dollars to provide the schools, roads and practically all public services that spell progress and achievement in this young Nation.

For these reasons I have associated myself with a group of public spirited citizens headed up by Mr. G. Allman of Claremont and outstanding men who are determined to see the next election, regardless of whom is elected, conducted in an honest manner according to the fundamental principles of fair play.
