\$15,000 for New County Home

The property committee of York County Council reported at the council session, Wednesday, Feb. 10th that they now have the deed to the Davis property in Newmarket which is to be the new home of York County Council. Miss Davis who gave the property to York County Council has completed certain renovations which add considerably to the appearance of the building. The committee recommended no major changes in the building, said the report. Floor covering in the halls, lighting, carpets and blinds, and a dias will be needed. These are estimated to cost about \$5,800.00. Should members of council deem it necessary to purchase vaults and furnishings an amount will have to be fixed to cover these items. Reeve Ralph Corner suggested a sum of \$15,000 be budgeted for to cover the moving and outfitting of the new quarters at Newmarket. After discussion and a reminder from Reeve Cook of Aurora that the overall budget had to be considered, this amount of \$15,000 was agreed to by county council. After visiting registry offices in Brampton and Guelph, the committee recommended that an addition to the Registry Office at Newmarket 65 feet by 50 feet be built costing approximately \$50,000.

The special assets committee reviewed the offers received and withdrawn from the Metropolitan Council for the York County Buildings and recommended that the buildings be offered for sale in the daily papers in Toronto and Montreal on the 12th and 13th of February. This County council agreed to. Tenders will be requested to be in the hands of the clerk by 5 p.m. March 8.

Health Unit Expands to Entire County on April 1st

York County Council in session on Wednesday, February 10th heard a report from their solicitor J.D. Lucas on the setting up of the Health Unit throughout the whole of York County and it was decided to start this health service on April 1st.

In view of the above the following facts taken from the January report of the Health Unit may be of interest to our readers. Doctor King, the director and medical officer of Health for the Health Unit says in his report, "The mid-winter increase in communicable diseases is apparent with 47 cases of chicken pox, 16 cases of mumps, 10 cases of scarlet fever, and 11 cases of whooping cough being reported in December. A considerable number of cases have, no doubt, not been reported or have not taken the precaution of being seen by the family physician and the total number of cases is probably much greater. Because of an apparent mildness of attack with such diseases as scarlet fever or whooping cough, parents sometimes neglect to have their children seen by the family doctor. This is a dangerous practice, even mild cases of these children's diseases after effects can be serious to the health of every child. Every child suspected of having measles, whooping cough or scarlet fever should be seen by the doctor. Kidney trouble and pneumonia are complications of these illnesses.

Detailed plans for launching a plumbing inspection program throughout the health unit area are now being drawn up, and the councils of each municipality will be approached soon to make the necessary arrangements for carrying out the program.
