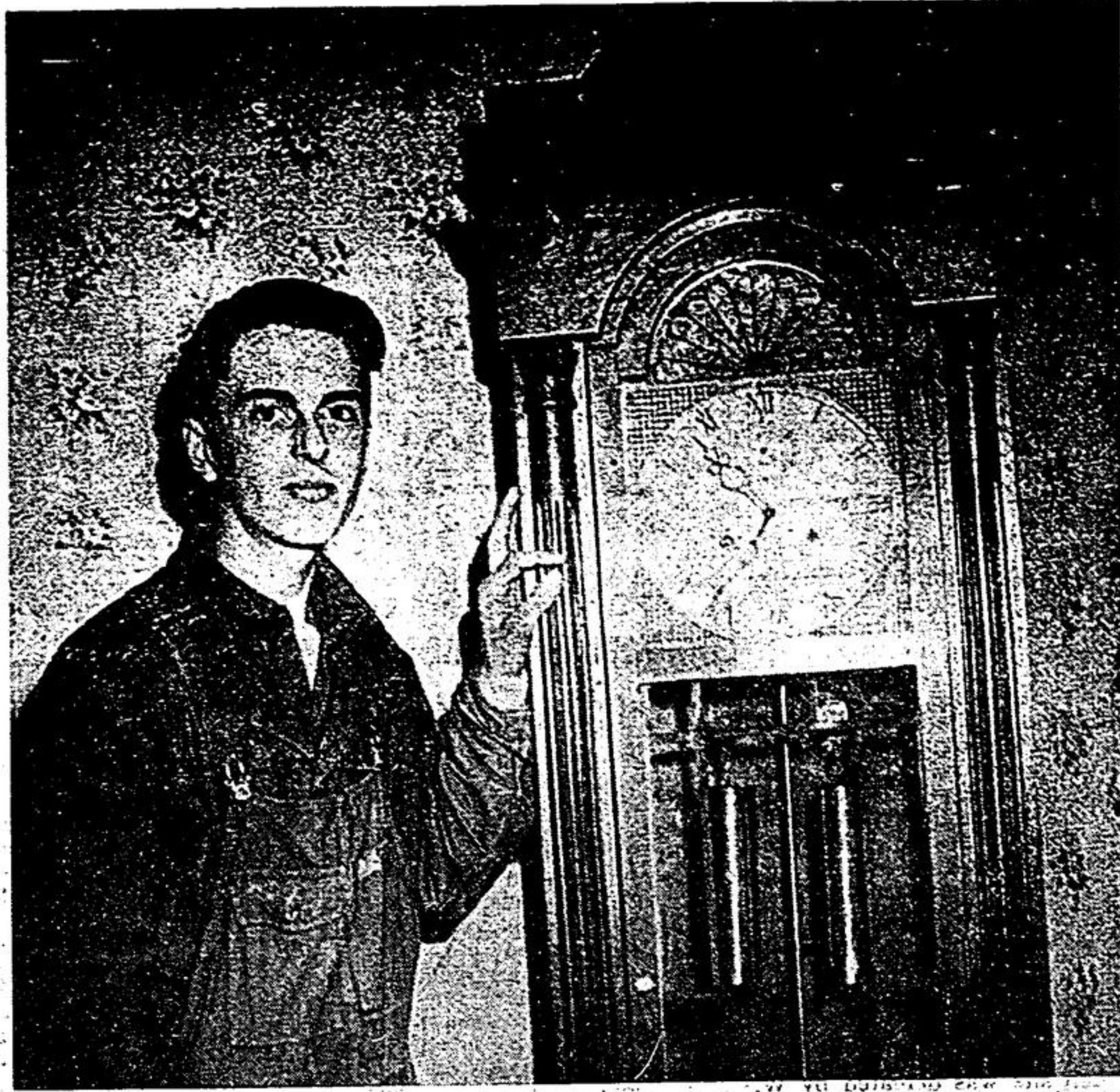
Notes on "Growing Pointsettias" by Mrs. Milt Storey.

The successful growing of pointsettias requires a few careful rules. They may drop their leaves because of gas in the air, too much or too little water, poor soil, late potting or too small a pot. The usual reasons however, are chilling. (The temperature is unsafe below 63 degrees), drafts and watering with cold water. If possible have some humidity in the air. They are fond of sunlight but never expose them suddenly to it. If possible give them an even temperature of around 70 degrees day and night. They often require 2 waterings a day.

After blooming give complete rest for 2 months. Place them in the basement, give very little water. After resting prune and give plant fresh soil. Place plant in the garden protected from winds for the summer. The growth removed in pruning can be used as slips to start new plants that will bloom for Christmas. Spray and bring indoors before any cold nights, place in sunny window, give daily watering and care.
