



PRESENTATION TO MR. AND MRS. BOB BANGAY

ONE COACH, TWO CUPS, THREE TEAMS
Two hockey teams from Brooklin have captured OMHA Championships according to Mr. Jim Austin, executive member. Brooklin's Bantam "D" squad downed Lucknow 14-4 and 14-2 and their Midget "D" team ousted Wainfleet 8-4 and 7-5 to win the A. P. McAvoy trophy. With but 24 players, coach Cliff Johnson has brought Brooklin two winners. The Juvenile team was defeated in the semi-finals. Another winner was decided on Friday night as Elmira defeated Unionville 10-3 to win the round 20-12. They were presented with the Dr. Leon Hipwell trophy emblematic of the Midget "B" honors.

WRESTLING AT ITS WORST
On Thursday night, your sports reporter was one of 10,000 spectators in attendance at the weekly wrestling show in Maple Leaf Gardens. The attraction of the show was a tag team match between the merciless Mills Brothers and the two heroes, 325 pound Hombre Montana and The Mighty Ursus, who tips the scales at a neat 300. I arrived at the Gardens around eight o'clock and purchased a ticket in the fifth row blue section. To get the night's proceedings off to an exciting start I had the pleasure of stepping through the turnstiles with the two most hated humans in the building — The Mills Brothers. They are huge men standing well over six feet in height and weighing over 260 pounds. Both were dressed in tight ankle-length trousers and wore heavy brown bush coats. Their greasy-black hair hung in long ringlets almost to their shoulders. While walking briskly to their dressing rooms, a few misconceived fans timidly requested autographs but all they received was an angry snarl and an ugly frown from the bone-bending brothers.

Five preliminary bouts were run off before the lights were dimmed and the four huge heavyweights strode up the ramp. The crowd appeared unusually quiet, almost as if they feared what was about to take place within the next thirty minutes. The two referees briefly searched the four wrestlers for concealed weapons and rhymed off a few unheeded rules and the battle was on.
For the first two or three minutes everything seemed fair and square and then suddenly one of the Mills Brothers unleashed a series of vicious blows to the face of Hombre Montana. From that point on all rules and regulations were tossed to the four winds. At one point in the match the crowd became almost hysterical and the Gardens attendants were kept busy patrolling the ringside area in case a riot should develop. One red-blooded fan could restrain himself no longer and with a run and a jump he scrambled up on the edge of the ring and attempted to crawl through the ropes. His courageous efforts were discouraged however as one of the officials wheeled and clipped the spectator on the chin with the toe of his boot. He immediately beat a hasty retreat and peaceably returned to his ringside seat.

The Mills Brothers although outweighed by nearly 125 pounds displayed some masterful fetes of strength. The Mighty Ursus, weighing a nifty 300 pounds was lifted into the air quite handsily by his powerful adversary and hurled over the ropes to the cement floor with comparative ease. It marked the first time that any wrestler in the Gardens had been able to lift the huge matman off his feet.
At 11 o'clock the curfew bell sounded and although the referees called the bout a draw, the wrestlers seemed dissatisfied to drop the issue then and there. Although the time had run out the four men continued their brawl as the crowd screamed with delight and excitement. Finally the wrestlers were separated and the villainous Mills Brothers strode down the ramp to their dressing room amid a shower of popcorn, oranges, programs and other miscellaneous missiles. The heroes were applauded loud and long for their valiant effort.

COACH CRACKS DOWN
Coach Bob Bangay of the Stouffville Clippers is taking a dim view of players who continually take trips to the penalty box for minor infractions of the rules. A number of players on the Clipper club have acquired the habit of hitting an opponent after the whistle, arguing with the officials, issuing criticism on the referee from the players' box or penalty box while play is in progress and other unnecessary rule infractions. Penalties not only put a team at a disadvantage but force a coach to mix up his lines. A penalized team is always on the defensive and only on rare occasions will a shorthanded club score a goal unless the opposition is unusually weak or a forward is fortunate enough to snare a loose puck and break into the clear. While two or three of the Stouffville Clippers are responsible for the club's shorthanded efforts, other players have compiled a "clean" record. Frank Stephenson, a hard-driving type of player has been "seldom seen" in the penalty box this season. Don McIntosh, although penalized quite frequently during the fore part of the season has compiled quite an enviable record for a defenceman in the later stages of the schedule and throughout the playoffs. Chick Webster, Polly Minton, Bert Baker, Ken McNeil and Ronnie Bell have also stayed shy of the cooler. The old saying "You can't score goals in the penalty box" still stands.

GREENBANK, PORT PERRY IN LEAGUE FINALS
Greenbank and Port Perry are battling it out for the Uxbridge-Port Perry Community League Championship. Port have a big lead in the series however and could capture the honors on Saturday night with a tie.
In their first meeting both clubs played to a 5-5 draw but Port Perry took the next two encounters by scores of 4-2 and 9-1. The Greenbank squad have been hard hit by injuries and were unable to ice a full team for the third game.

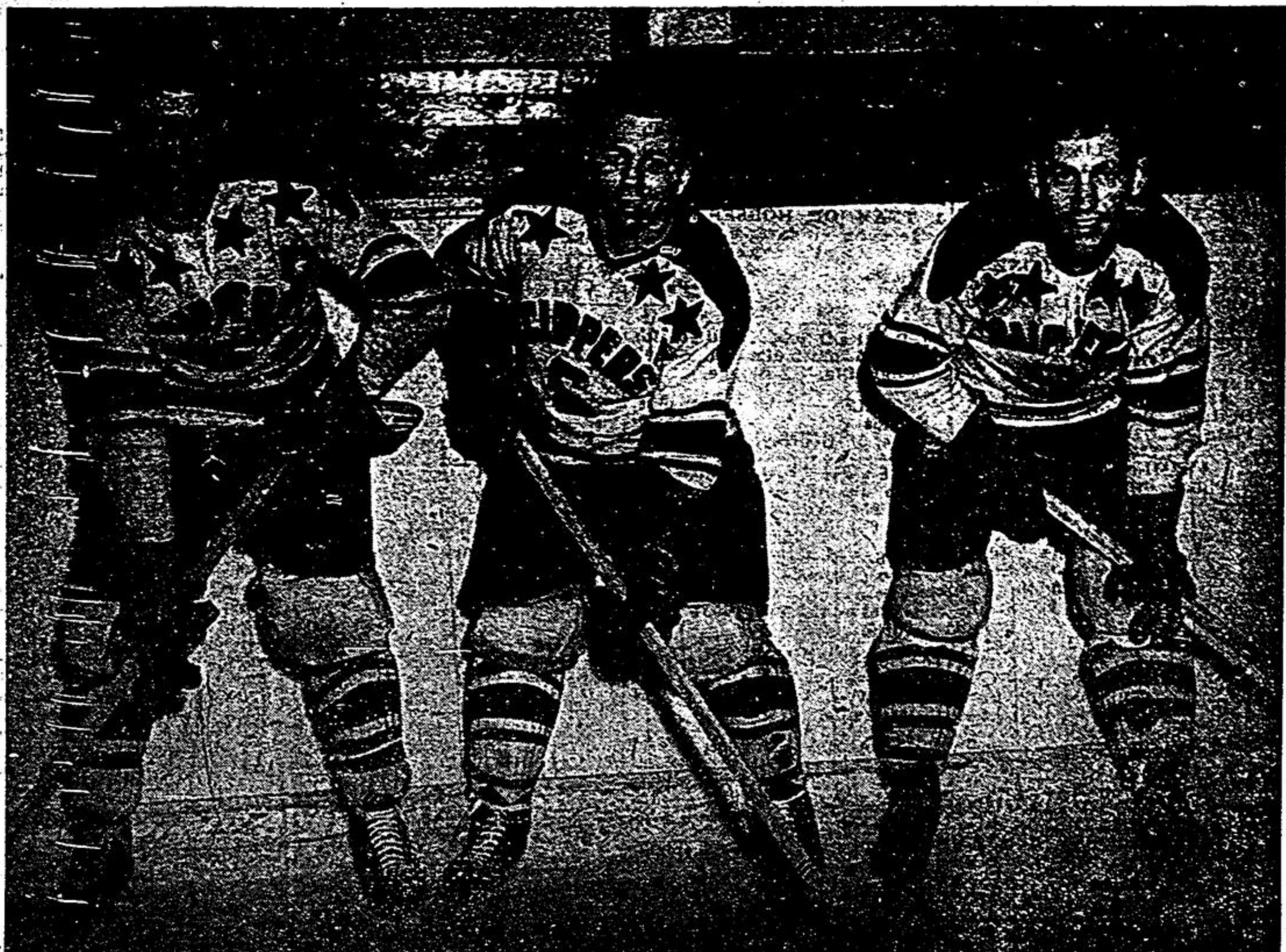
Wings Topple Rangers in Peewee NHL

Don Haynes' Detroit Red Wings knocked the high-flying New York Rangers out of first place in the Lions NHL round-robin playoff series on Saturday afternoon with a 2-1 victory. Malcolm, first line forward with the powerful Detroit squad counted his club's only goals. Don Neal notched the lone tally for Rangers. The New York loss coupled with a win for the Wings and Leafs dropped Rangers into third place tied with Hawks. Boston and Montreal are deadlocked in the cellar position.

In the second game the Leafs ran wild in the final minutes with Boston and trounced the Bruins by the score of 6-3. Wideman and Jackson paced the winners' attack with two goals each. Hendricks and Beasley were the other Leaf marksmen. Kennedy, Malcolm and Redshaw were the goal scorers for Boston. Both teams failed to score on numerous wide-open chances as many of their shots were wide of the mark. With the score deadlocked at 3-3, Wayne Redshaw and Ron Hedges sailed in on Grensted in the Leaf net but a close-in drive bounced off the backboards. A few minutes later both players cut in over the Toronto blueline with only one man back but once again a hard shot missed the net. From that point on, Wideman, Dawson, Jackson and Hendricks took over for the Leafs and they made no mistakes when in front of the Boston cage. Wideman made it 4-3 on an end to end rush and Jackson put his club two up with a rink-long solo dash. In the final game of the afternoon, Canadians and the Hawks battled to a 2-2 tie. In the final minutes of the contest, Canadian goalie Murray Holden vacated the Montreal net and rightwinger Glenn Pennanen joined forwards Don Tran, Bob Todd and Bill Sanders in an all out attack. With two seconds to go, Tran intercepted a goalmouth pass and beat Wilkes in the Hawk cage to split the points. The Chicago team under the coaching eye of Prov. Police Constable W. S. Hilliard turned in one of their best performances of the season. Mike McStravick was a powerhouse on the Hawk first line scoring the first goal. Glenn Mowder was given credit for the other. Second line Montreal speedster Mike Eppworth let go a backhand shot that bounced off a stick into the twine giving Wilkes no chance to make the stop.

Tod was a member of the Whitby Juveniles when they won the Lionel Conacher Trophy some years ago, also of the Whitby Red Wings Junior "C" when they won the Jr. "C" Championship of Ontario 1945-1946.
For the Redmen he was playing left wing. He is 27 years of age, joining the Port Hope Club late in the season. He played last year for Uxbridge and East York.

Clippers Can Take Group Honors By Winning on Wednesday Night

Stouffville Clippers can capture the Metro Sr. "B" group championship on Wednesday night either with a win or a tie.
On Monday night the Clippers came from behind a two goal deficit in the first period to win 5-2. Leaside's big line of Brankston, Boniface and Sinclair ran out of steam in the final frame and the Stouffville crew took advantage of their superior strength to run wild in a scoring way. The Clippers notched three unanswered tallies in the third period.
Jim Casburn and Ken Sinclair put the East Toronto squad two up midway through the first period of play. Ronnie Bell cut down the lead with a perfect corner shot on passes from Frank Stephenson and Ken McNeil.
Webster put the clubs on even terms at 18:09 of the second period when he deflected Stark's drive past Gilbert in the Leaside cage. Stouffville ran into a flood of cheap penalties and for eight minutes of the twenty minute period they were forced to play a-man short.

Brankston hit the twine for his second and third tallies. Melville was off on a penalty when the visitors tied the game.
The Toronto Club jumped into the lead early in the last period when Boniface scored. It appeared that Stouffville had killed their chances when Haddleton was banished with a slashing penalty and Small was posted with a minor and a misconduct a couple of minutes later. Leaside ran into the same trouble however, as no less than five players in succession took a trip to the cooler. Stouffville capitalized on their advantage in numbers and outscored their rivals 3-1. Webster, Lewis and Baker all blinked the light in order. Madgy fired the lone Leaside tally.
