(Continued from front page) tions from the congregation, and already, with just two weeks of the campaign begun, over one-fourth of the required sum has been received.
The next project will be to build a church on this property. As J. Allan Heise, assistant superintendent of the Sunday School, said on Sunday morning, "Many of the children who come here on Sunday, attend this day school, or the school at Lake Wilcox. They should associate the service of worship with a church and not the every day class room. This school has served us well as a meeting place, but these children should have their own church building."
Rev. Roy Nigh of Unionville, is pastor of Sunshine Sunday School, as well as the churches of his denomination at Gormley and the 3rd concession of Vaughan. He began the Sunday School at Oak Ridges 15 years ago, and has been assisted for almost as many years by J. Allan Heise of Gormley. On Sunday mornings a bus brings the children from the scattered district on the east side of Yonge St. The average attendance is 150, although on special days, there have often been as many as 225 boys and girls present on Sunday mornings.
While the children are being taught in their separate classes, Mr. J. Heise leads a senior Bible study group, with usually 25 adults present. At the evening service, with Rev. Mr. Nigh preaching, the congregation averages 60 persons. The faithful Sunday School teachers include the Misses Blanche, Ruth, and Freda Henderson, Jean Brillinger, Irma Heise, Mr. and Mrs. J. Allan Heise and Harold Heise, all of Gormley, Mrs. Roy Nigh of Unionville, and Miss Lois Wright of Oak Ridges.
