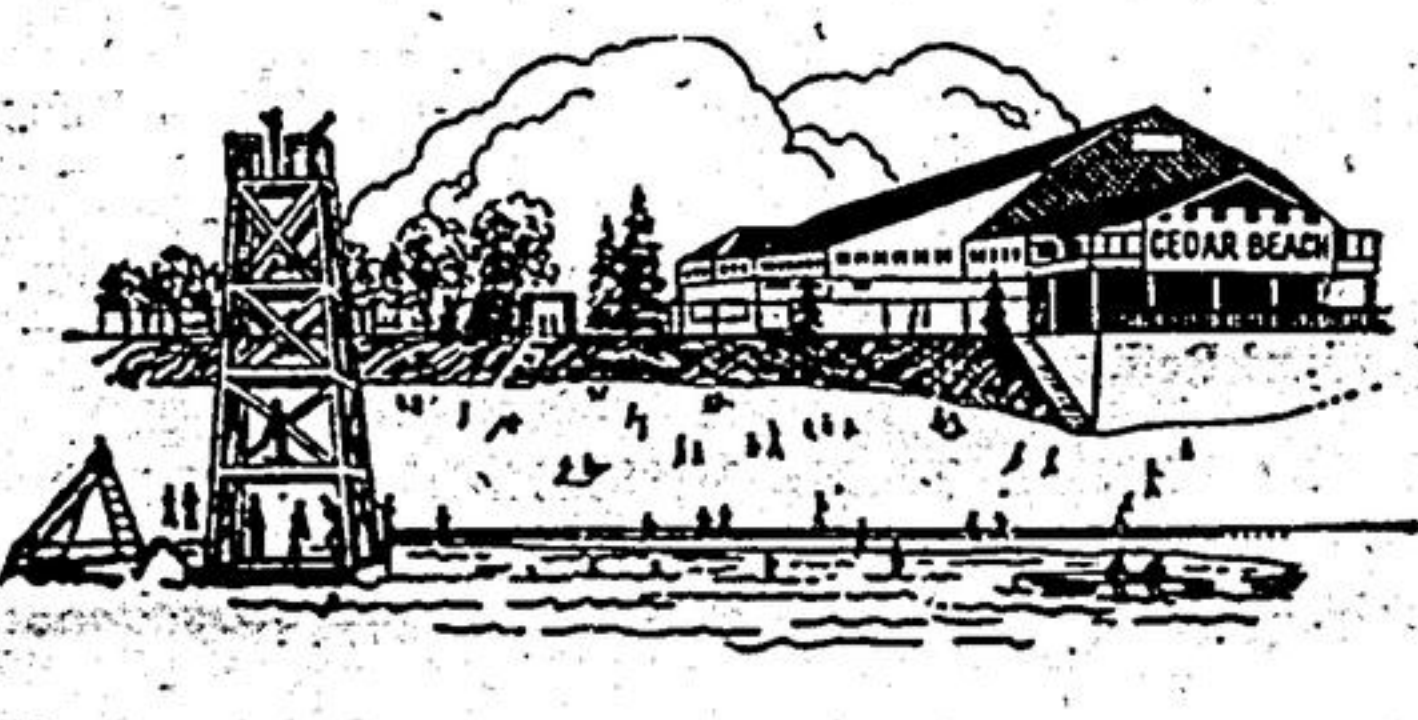

Mr. Keevil in his capacity of Regional Supervisor has under his direct administration, personnel of the GOBC who man Observation Posts at Stouffville, Goodwood, Seagrave, Uxbridge, Port Perry and Myrtle. These volunteers, along with Clare Keevil, are part of the Defence Team who, together with trained volunteers throughout the country, are playing an active part in the defence of Canada by "keeping their eyes on the skies". In presenting the GOBC Wings to Mr. Keevil, W-C J.A. Wiseman, AFCC, Staff Officer GOBC from Air Defence Command HQ, St. Hubert, Que., personally thanked him for his time and efforts.

Also present at the ceremony were W-C T. G. Anderson, AFCC, Sector Commander and S-Ldr C. E. Harris, DFC, Commanding Officer of the Ground Observer Corps for Ontario. Both these Officers paid tribute to the work done by the volunteers of the GOBC and stressed the part they play not only in the defence of our country but also in aiding aircraft in distress. "A Visual sighting by GOBC volunteers," S-Ldr Harris said "could save thousands of dollars and many hours of time by not having to alert certain areas when it is known from reports received that the missing aircraft could not possibly be in that area."

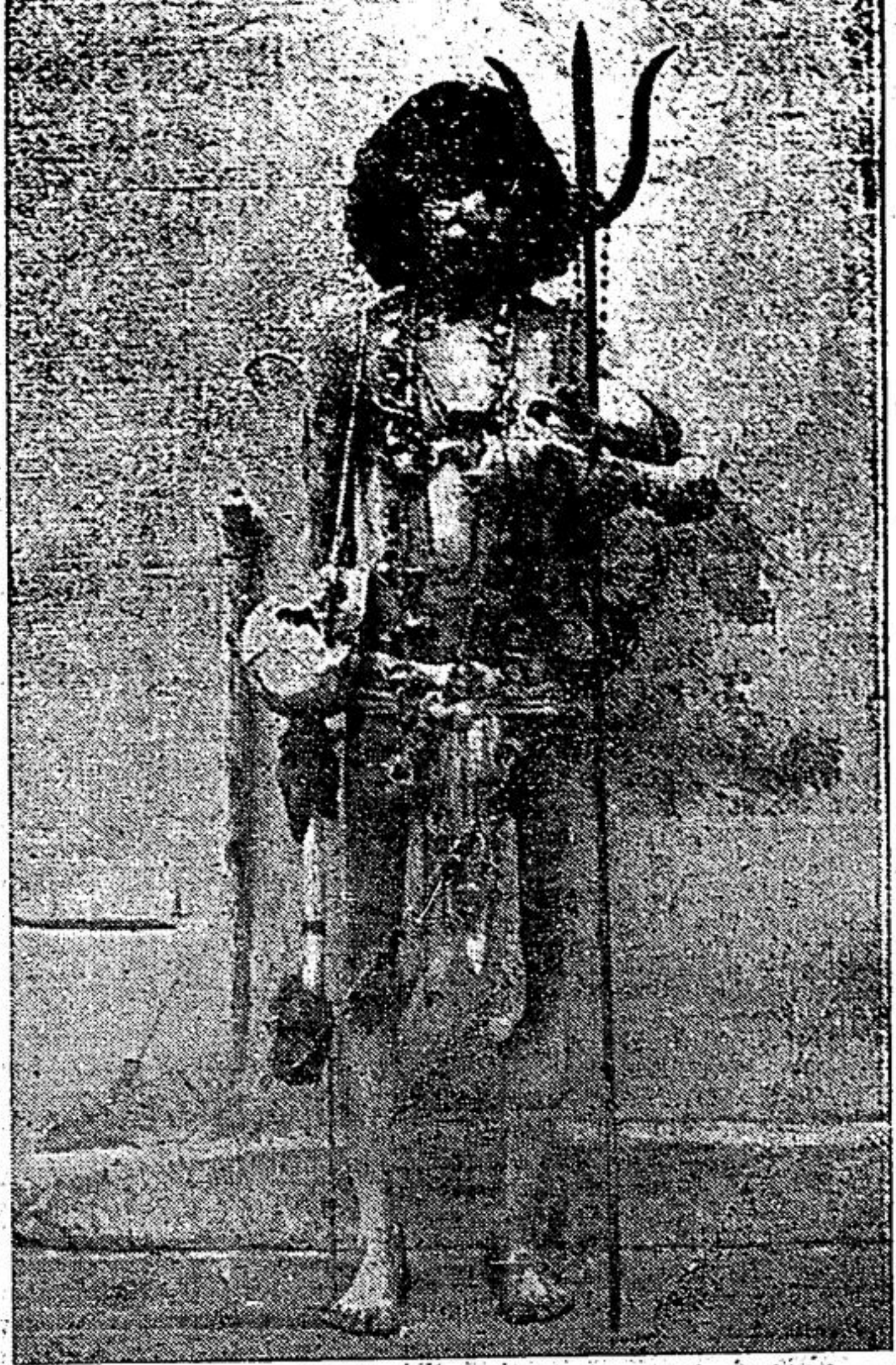

INDIAN HOLY MAN

The sadhu or holy man pictured above is, by Indian standards, remarkable. You will note that he has three human skulls on his person out of which he eats and drinks. He has a necklace of skulls of small animals such as cats, rats, monkeys, etc. His staff is a human thigh bone and he also carries the typical holy man's iron rod shaped like a pitch fork. Entwined on the prongs of the fork are his prayer beads. His body is matted with a white paste made of coal ash and cow manure.

It is said that the estimated 5,000,000 cadhus of India represent the greatest single influence among constitutionally secular India's 360,000,000 population. These men wander throughout the length and breadth of India begging for alms.

Sadhu Immovable Bliss said after completing a 2000-mile walking tour of India: "Every village I passed through has at least one sadhu living in it and the village people do everything the sadhu tells them to do. They think the holy man is God reincarnated."
