More Interest In Museum

Invitations sent out recently by the York Pioneer and Historic Society to key people in York County, brought 40 interested men and women out to hear Miss Dorothy Drever of the Ontario Museum relate what had been done at the Sharon Temple in the last year and what should be done if York County's History is to be preserved. "I worked with the committee who cleaned the building and contents last spring," said Miss Drever, "and was impressed by the building itself. It is unique on this continent. It is an expression of the deep religious faith of its builders. The feeling grew that it should be used as its builders intended as a religious shrine and not as a store house for farm implements of the past. David Wilson's (builder of the temple) study, and his old home should be restored and could be used for relics not suitable for storage in the temple." Mr. Frank Ramsay of Sharon was present and told the group, "the old Wilson home is on my property I have been loath to pull it down. I hoped that the York Pioneers might someday be interested in removing it to the Temple property. It should be preserved, as an example of the homes our forefathers built." "Too many of our historical items are finding their way across the border," said Miss Drever.

This meeting held in the Agricultural Board rooms in Newmarket was attended by District Presidents of the W.L.S. who affiliated with the York Pioneers in 1951.

Mr. C. Clark of Markham asked if some idea of the county rate could be given at this meeting for the direction of clerks in making up the township tax rates. Warden Bye replying said, "we can set a tentative budget only. We are applying for assistance with our undue burden, we do not know what assistance we will receive. Your clerks and councils are aware of the situation. I feel that if you set too high or too low a rate you will not be required unduly. Most councils are striking a 10-13 mills for the county rate."

Missionary Speaks At Convention

Rev. Richard Reilly is the General Secretary of the United Missionary Society, which maintains its headquarters in Elkhart, Indiana. He is recently returned from India, where he spent over five years laboring as a missionary.

A short biography of the life of this dynamic young missionary might begin with his early life on the streets of Detroit, Michigan as a newsboy. In this environment he faced all the wickedness and the temptations of the city. Only the grace of God kept him from following his former companions in their lives of sin, which took many of them to prison. Then one night Dick answered the call of God in a small Monday night Bible Class, which is now the Detroit Bible Institute.

During the depression Dick was forced to quit school and work full time. By attending night school he was able to finish high school and proceed on

to Bible school, college, and seminary, and has also been able to secure a private airplane pilot's license.

Rev. Reilly has worked as a youth evangelist with the "America Back to God" movement, pastored a church in Indiana, and served as the first full-time Director of Elkhart County Youth For Christ. Then God called him to be a missionary to India, that land of 362 million souls who are still in darkness. Here he served as principal of the Raghunathpur Bible Institute, two years as Director of Calcutta Youth For Christ, and the Eastern Representative of Youth For Christ. It was under his leadership that Youth For Christ began a broadcast over the world's most powerful short wave station, Radio Ceylon, which has a coverage extending from South Africa to Sweden and northwestern United States. In addition to his other duties as a missionary he has taken Youth For Christ teams up into the towering Himalayan Mountains among the Naga headhunting tribes of Assam and beyond to the Burma border.

Rev. Reilly has scores of miraculous incidents to relate. His overwhelming enthusiasm about missionary work thrills every listener. No one can hear him without visualizing the inevitable results of not taking the Gospel abroad. Still no one can hear him without visualizing the working of God among the crowds of India. Rev. Reilly will be speaking at the United Missionary Church, Stouffville, on Sunday evening at the closing of the great Missionary Convention. Time—7:30.
