AN EXPENSIVE HOBBY

The Sarnia Arena Commission reported recently a loss of \$14,783 and decided never again to try to operate hockey teams in the "semi-professional league." The Commission in 1953-54 backed the Sarnia Sailors in the Ontario Hockey Association Sr. "A" series and another Sailor team in Junior "B". The Seniors lost \$13,471 and the Juniors \$3,699.

The Sudbury Wolves on the other hand seem to be financially secure. During the regular schedule the Wolves drew 154,779 paid admissions an average of 5,159 a game. In six playoffs they packed in 37,173, an average of 6,195. The Wolves' share of the gate for league play was \$8,994 while the rink received \$61,143. Now you can see why they will pay up to \$200 a week for experienced talent in the Nickle Belt.
