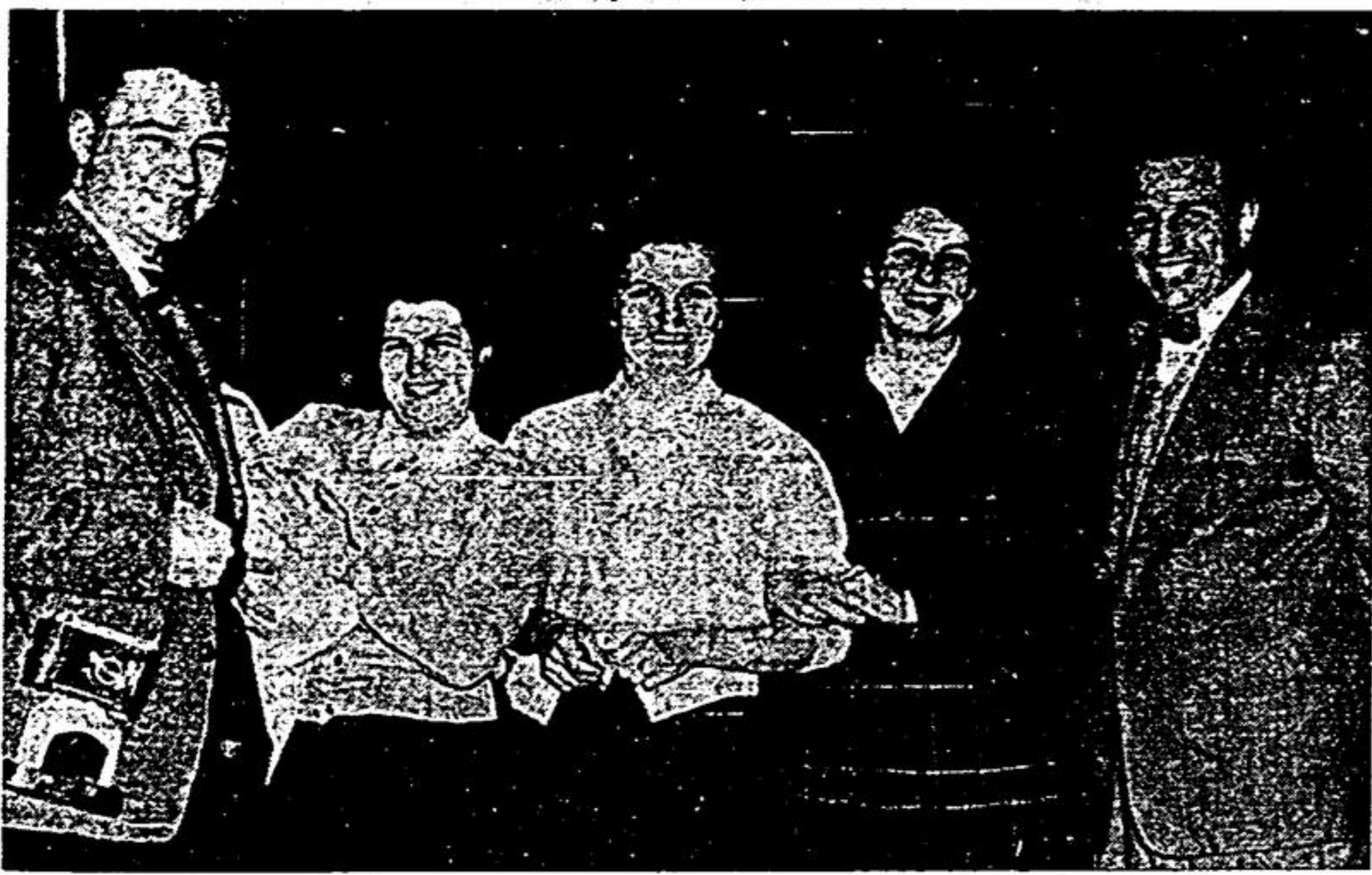


REUNION OF LOCAL FOLKS IN ENGLAND

On Sunday night the southbound train is at 9.26.
