It was decided to re-organize and carry on a High Yield Potato Club in 1954. The membership fee will be \$2.00 and a banquet will be held in the fall if the necessary arrangements can be made. Trophies for high yield and high quality together with prize money will be presented at this banquet.

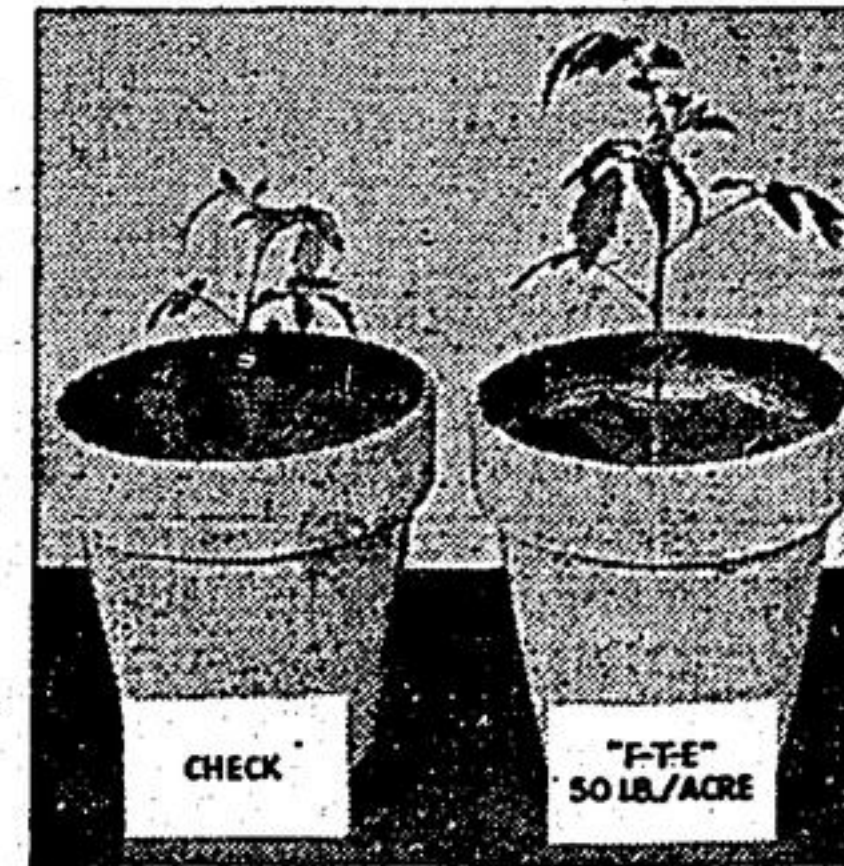

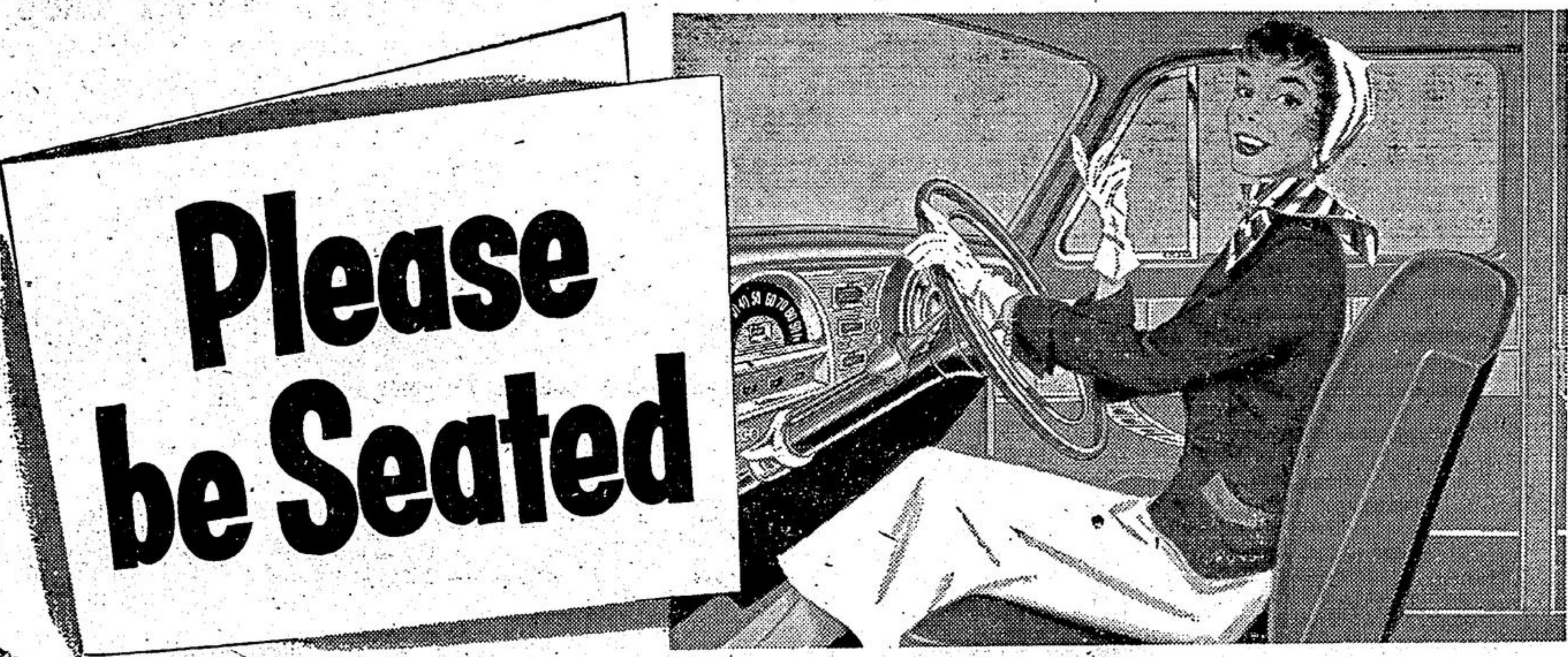

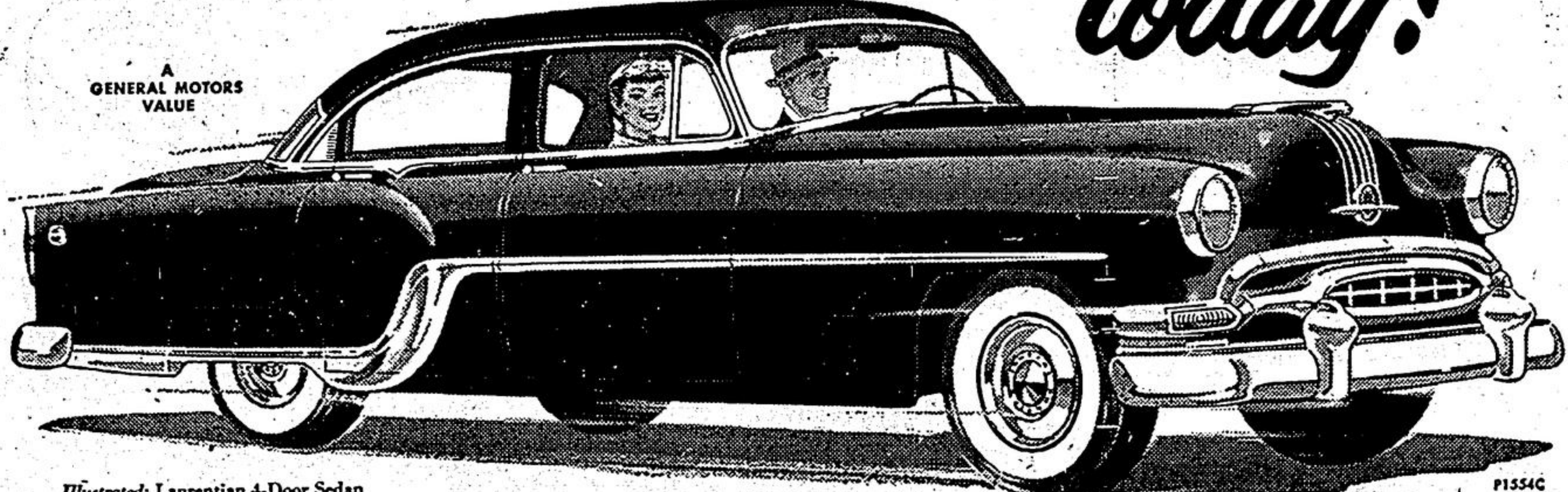
