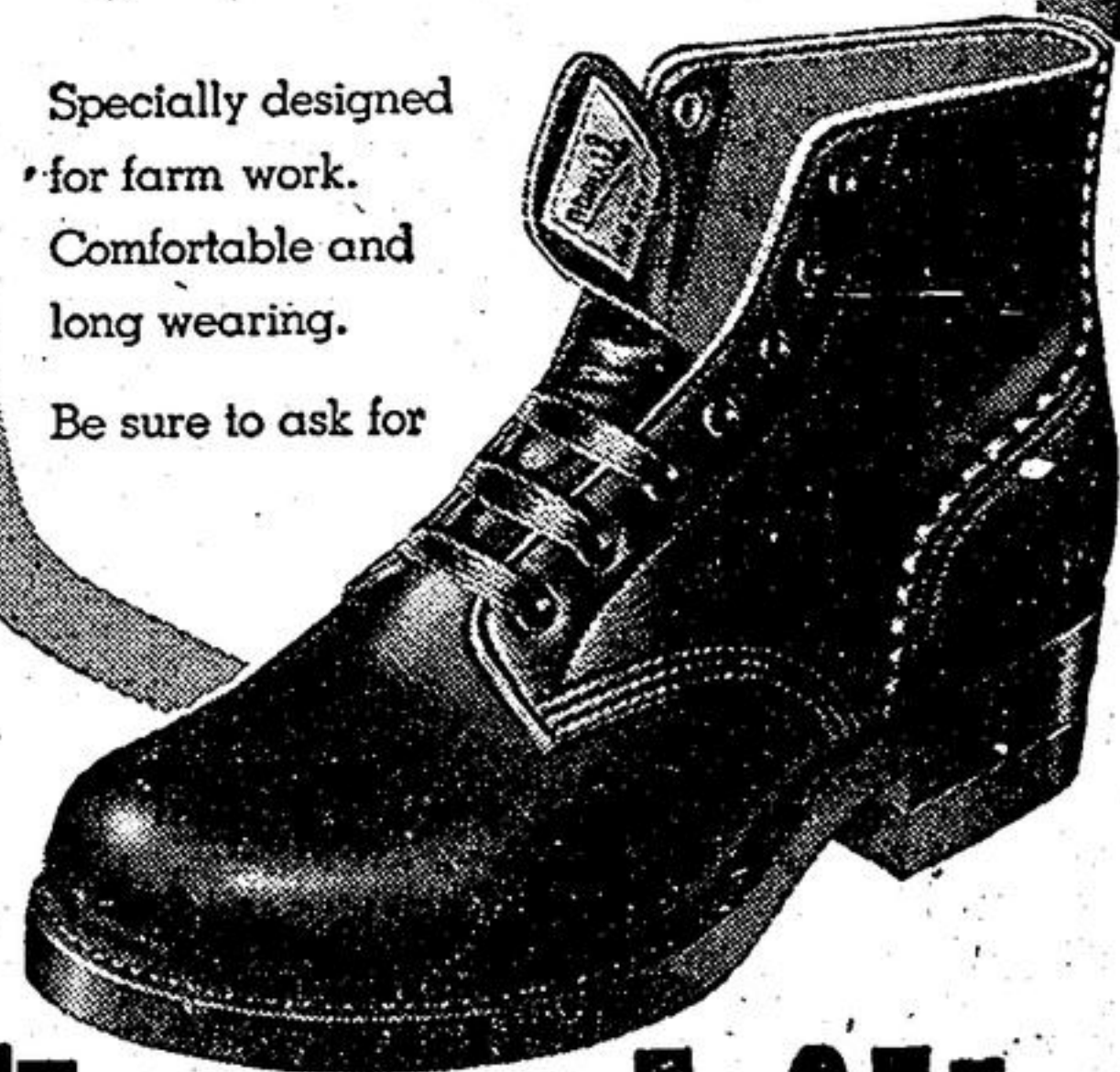
The York County Police Association have presented copies of these same pictures of Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh to all council chambers in York County.
