Carl Boynton Jr. Farmer Head

Climaxing an extremely active career in 4-H Clubs and Junior Farmer work, Carl Boynton of Woodbridge, R.R. 1, last week was elected President of the Junior Farmers' Association of Ontario at their annual meeting attended by over four hundred delegates at the Ontario Agricultural College. At twenty-four, Carl is working with his father, Russell Boynton, on a dairy farm where they have developed a fine herd of Holsteins and he modestly gives credit for his success in junior work to the encouragement given by his parents, themselves former junior farmers.

Starting in 4-H Calf Clubs about ten years ago, Carl completed his projects for six consecutive years and in addition was a 4-H Grain Club member in 1948 when he was a member of York County's provincial champion team which stood second in the National Grain Club competition. Having competed regularly in the County and other livestock and seed judging competitions, as well as holding several offices including president of the Vellore Junior Farmers, he was awarded the trip to 4-H Club Congress at the Chicago International in 1949.

The following year he was selected as one of a team of four boys to represent Ontario in the International Live Stock Judging Competition in Great Britain. In 1952, he was elected president of the York Junior Farmers' Association and director of the Ontario Junior Farmers' Association and is now serving his third term in this capacity.
