Authority Given For Conservation

Falling water tables in south-western Ontario County and south-eastern York County have brought about the formation of a conservation authority to deal with four minor rivers: Highland Creek, the Rouge River, Petticoat Creek and Duffin's Creek. Decrease of subterranean water supplies has worked hardship for farmers and suburban residents alike, particularly in the vicinity of Pickering.

The farmers have had to haul water for their cattle; home owners have had to buy water for their wells. Truckers have developed a regular business of tanking 500 or 1,000 gallons of water to residential properties to replenish depleted wells.

Within the watersheds of the four small streams, lie nearly 200,000 acres of land. During the coming summer, the Conservation Branch, Department of Planning and Development, will undertake a survey for the authority, which represents 10 municipalities and the federal development district of Ajax.

Objective of the authority is to find means of restoring the water tables. Methods to be applied will presumably include the establishment of farm ponds, better land management to retain precipitation and reforestation of the headwaters of the streams.

Although there have been widely publicized floods on Highland Creek and Duffin's Creek there is little expectation that massive flood control works will be undertaken. The authority is primarily and seriously interested in basic conservation, chiefly of the area's water resources. In this regard, information available from the Department of Mines water level records will be carefully studied.

Six 4-H Calf Clubs Organized in York

Nearly 100 boys and girls throughout York County attended the organizational meetings of York County 4-H Calf Clubs. The Clubs, organized during the month of April, will continue with monthly meetings until their Achievement Day is held at the local fall fair. During the summer, the members will personally feed and care for the calf they have selected for the project. This is in keeping with the motto of 4-H Club work—"Learn to Do by Doing". Another feature of the project is the keeping of monthly records of the cost of the feed; consumed by the calf. The largest membership of any of the Clubs is the Woodbridge 4-H Calf Club with 27 members. Other Clubs organized are the Sutton, Schomberg, Markham, Sharon and the York County Baby Beef Clubs. This latter club is the one which entitles members to take part in the Queen's Guinness Competition at the Royal Winter Fair.

With the exception of the Sutton Club, it is still possible for boys and girls, 12 years old by May 1st and under 21 by November 1st, to become members in any of these clubs, provided they make immediate inquiry. Agricultural College, Guelph, included in the agenda. They will return to Britain on July 21st from Quebec.

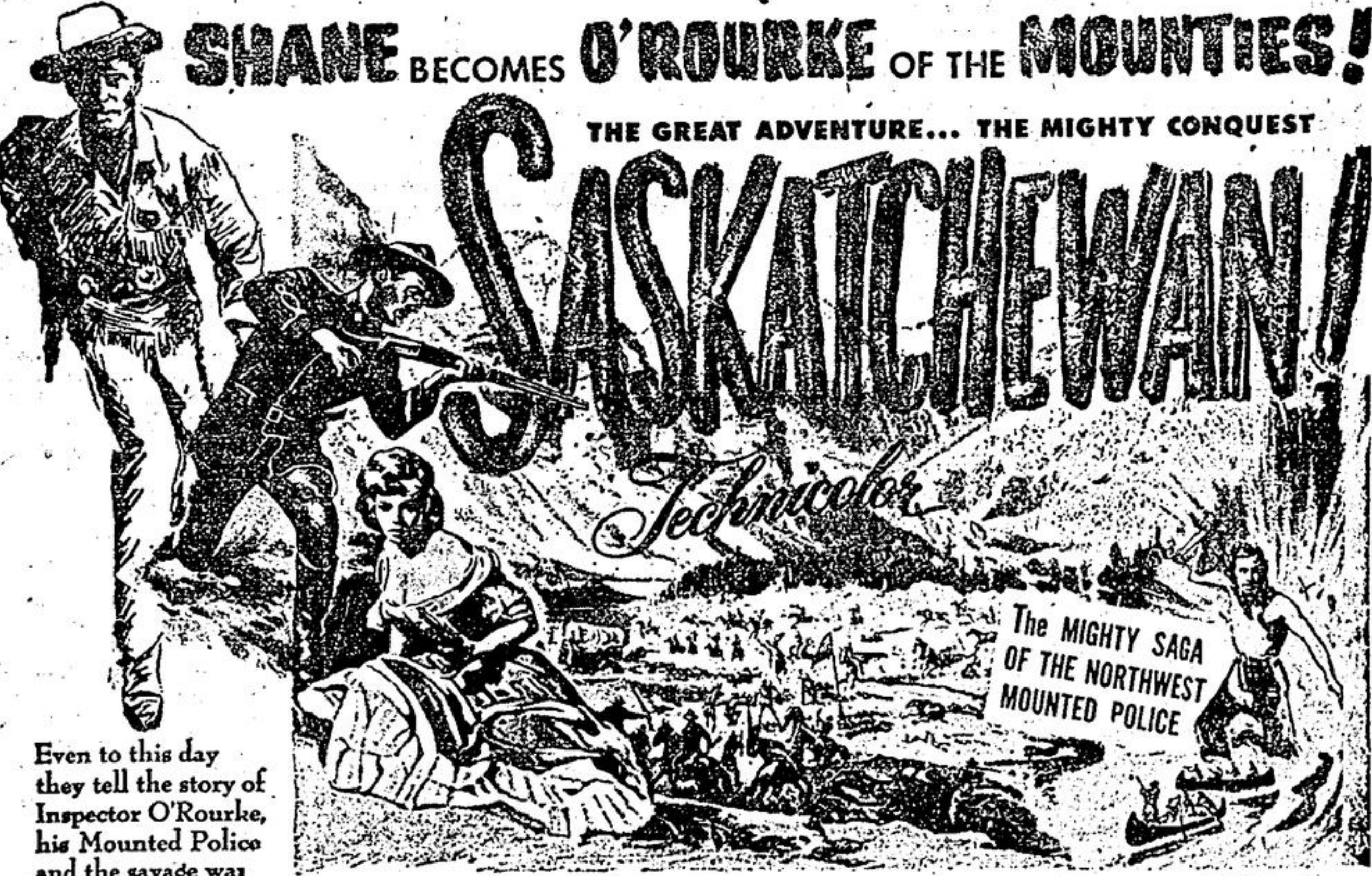
