Built in 1857

Historic Town Hall Being Demolished

Pickering Village Town Hall, a historic landmark, is being demolished. Built in 1857 the building was first the church home of Pickering Presbyterians. Early records of the church have been lost, as have records over the building in 1880 when St. Andrew's, now the United Church, was built.

Pickering Village senior residents recall seeing their first moving pictures in the Town Hall soon after the turn of the century. Two strong steel hooks in the ceiling were placed there about 1905 when a travelling

show visited Pickering and a trapeze artist gave the audience a thrill as she swung overhead from stage to balcony in the rear.

Medicine shows and other stock companies put on shows there from time to time. William Murkar recalls seeing "Uncle Tom's Cabin" there about 1903. He recalls three huge bloodhounds leaping across the ice, and Simon LeGree, the heavy villain.

In the wooden tower a bell was hung, in 1890. This bell was used for a fire alarm. George

Cowan, a shoemaker, was entrusted with the job of ringing the bell at 7 a.m., 12 noon, 1 p.m. and 6 p.m.

The bell was also rung on special occasions, such as the death of a sovereign armistice day and of course, on New Year's Eve.

Replacing the old building, a new municipal building is to be built in the park. The contract has been let and the building will cost \$13,500. The municipal offices, public library and a small auditorium for the use of Pickering organizations are its main features.

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Potato Growers Adopt Constitution

Directors of the newly organized Ontario Potato Growers Association adopted constitution and bylaws at a recent meeting. Provision was made for the setting up of local units as branches of the Provincial organization, which will be made up of twenty directors representing the entire province. They, in turn, will represent approximately sixty thousand potato growers. Some local units already have potato growers' organizations and it is expected these will affiliate with the new organization.

Delegates to the annual meeting will be named from the local associations on the basis of one delegate from each unit or fifty members, not to exceed four from any one local.

Delegates will have power to elect directors and directors may elect an executive. Provision is made for a closer relationship between growers and retail and wholesale channels of trade. This year's chairman, Harold Willan, Leamington, presided at the recent meeting. Clarence Leach, Alliston, was elected to head up a committee to deal with problems of late potato and seed growers. All directors from late-producing areas will be members of this committee.

The objects of the Association make provision for working closely with other provinces; and other organizations which represent the industry on a national or international basis with the betterment of the industry as a whole the prime consideration.

Reports of Directors indicated that there is a great need in Ontario for central warehousing and growers' groups are anxious that an active policy should be established.
